A hike in this environment requires good ankle support and a treaded sole. • Pack extra water and snacks. Traveling in high elevations, requires lots of water. Don't drink from streams or lakes without treating the water! • Alway take a rain parka; thunderstorms come up quickly. • In the event of a lightning storm, get below treeline quickly.

Mountain Hiking

In preparation for hiking, visitors from lower elevations should take a couple of days to adjust to the park's high altitude before doing strenuous hikes. Drinking lots of water and taking short, easy hikes under two miles long are suggested.

Pets, Wildlife, Strollers

- No pets are allowed on trails; pets are permitted along roadways and parking lots, but must be closely leashed.
- Strollers are permitted only on the nature trails around Sprague and Bear lakes.
- Do not approach or feed wildlife.



Craggy peaks and stunning lakes reward visitors to the montane ecosystem of Moraine Park and the subalpine ecosystem of Bear Lake. Short trails from Bear Lake connect to higher lakes – Nymph, Dream, and Emerald. Flattop Mountain, and Cub, Fern, and Odessa Lakes may also be reached via trails from Bear Lake or Moraine Park.

Shuttle Buses

Free shuttle buses operate through the summer along the upper parts of Bear Lake Road. Please refer to your park newspaper or check at a visitor center for current bus schedules. Bear Lake corridor buses may be accessed by parking at Park & Ride.

Bear Lake Route

Buses leave from Park & Ride going to Bear Lake with stops at Bierstadt Lake Trailhead and Glacier Gorge Junction.

Moraine Park Route

Buses leave from Fern Lake Bus Stop going to Park & Ride with stops at Cub Lake Trailhead, Moraine Park Campground, Moraine Park Museum and Tuxedo Park.

Hiker Shuttle


Buses leave from Estes Park Visitor Center going to Park & Ride with a brief stop at the Beaver Meadows Vistor Center.


