Backcountry Camping

Several backcountry campsites are located in the Wild Basin area. A backcountry permit is required for backpacking in the park. Permits are available at the Wild Basin Ranger Station (hours of operation vary), and at the Backcountry Office, next door to the Beaver Meadows Visitor Center near Estes Park. Water is available at the Wild Basin Entrance Station, seasonally.

Located in the southeast corner of Rocky Mountain National Park, Wild Basin is drained by the North St. Vrain Creek and its tributaries. Numerous alpine lakes dot the area, with Thunder and Bluebird among the most dramatic in the park. Mountain peaks reaching over 13,000' above sea level form a rock boundary on the north, south, and west sides of this high mountain valley. Bighorn sheep, mountain lions, bears, elk, mule deer, and many smaller mammals and birds live in the area.

Narrow Road, Limited Parking

The Wild Basin Road is gravel and narrows to one lane in many spots. It is not suitable for large vehicles like RVs. Park in designated areas only. Wide spots in the road are for oncoming cars to pass each other, not for parking. Violators may be ticketed or towed.

Essentials to Wear and Carry

Be prepared in the backcountry! Pack the "Essentials" and don't forget the most important thing of all... common sense!

- Lots of water
- High-energy food
- Rain gear
- Hat, sunglasses with UV protection, sunscreen
- First aid kit
- Topographic map and compass/GPS

- Flashlight or headlamp
- Waterproof matches
- Pocket knife
- Sturdy footwear
- Whistle
- Common sense!

Altitude

Take sufficient time to acclimatize to the park's high altitude before doing strenuous hikes. Rest, drink lots of fluids (avoiding alcohol and caffeine), and start with short hikes.
