Interpretive Trails

The Desert Ecology Trail is a paved quarter-mile wheelchair accessible loop trail located near the Mica View Picnic Area. Interpretive signs explain how plants and animals use the limited water resources of the Sonoran Desert.

The Freeman Homestead Nature Trail is a one-mile loop trail located near the Javelina Picnic Area. Interpretive signs discuss early and modern Tucson as well as homesteading in the desert during the late 1800's and early 1900's.

Frontcountry Trails

Approximately forty miles of trails wind their way through the cactus forest in the Rincon Mountain District. The terrain varies from fairly level to gently rolling to moderately steep.

Use the map of the trail system, shown on the reverse side of this brochure, to plan your own hiking adventure in Saguaro National Park. Park staff will be glad to offer suggestions.

Backcountry Access

The Tanque Verde Ridge and Douglas Spring Trails lead to the higher elevations of the Rincon Mountain Wilderness Area.

Backcountry permits are required for all overnight stays.

Permits can be obtained free of charge at the visitor center.
