The data in this report was collected with the original intention of including it as a part of the Historic Structures Report on Derby Wharf and Warehouses ; but because of the volume of material found,~~in~~ this information is herewith present^{ed} as a supplement to ~~said~~ Historic Structure Report. The writer has compiled "Vessels, Voyages, Masters, and Ports of Call" with the hope that this study will (1) provide National Park Service interpreters with an abundance of accurate data to be used in telling the story of Derby Wharf, and (2), to provide an advanced and solid base from which further research into the mercantile operations of Elias Hasket Derby can be launched at some future date.

The report has been divided into seven parts as follows:

Section I, using statistics to document ~~in~~ his case, the writer has attempted to explain precisely why Salem and Elias Hasket Derby were truly of national significance in the foreign commerce of the United States during the period 1784-1799.

Section II is a chronological listing of virtually every trading vessel that Elias Hasket Derby dispatched from Derby Wharf, Salem, from June 1, 1785 until August 1799. The list shows how many vessels went out each year, provides the dates of loading, and the names of the vessels, their masters, and their destinations. Summary charts reveal how long Derby owned each vessel, the number of voyages each boat made, and the total numbers and types of vessels ^{outbound} utilized by Derby from the end of the War for Independence until his death on September 8, 1799.

Utilizing the data presented in section II it is quite feasible to calculate when and what vessels must have been tied up at Derby Wharf taking on cargo for evry ^{each} year from 1785 to 1799.

Section III is a chronological listing of all Elias Hasket Derby in-bound vessels during the period June 1, 1786 to December 1794. This list shows how many vessels came in to Derby Wharf each year, provides the date of unloading, and the names of the vessels, their/~~their~~ masters, and the ports from which they came. Summary charts reveal how long Derby owned each vessel, the number of in-bound voages each boat made, and the total number and types of vessels ^{used} ~~utilized~~ by Elias H. Derby from 1786 to 1794.

Utilizing this list it is possible to calculate accurately when and what Derby vessels were tied up at Derby wharf unloading their cargoes from June 1786 through December 1794.

Section IV contains an alphabetically arranged list of the names of 107 master or captains who commanded vessels carrying cargoes for Elias Hasket Derby during the period June 1, 1785 to August 1799. Under ~~each name of
each commanding officer~~ is the number of cutbound and in-bound voyages made, the names of each vessel, its type, date of sailing, and destination, that the captain commanded. A study of this list quickly reveals the names of Derby's chief mariners during the period 1785 to 1799.

Section V: ^{Chief} provides a list of the ¹ ports of call visited by Elias Hasket Derby's trading voyages ~~in~~ during the period June 1, 1785 to August 1799. The ports are arranged under continents and regions ~~with continents~~. Under the name of each port is listed the numbers of inbound and outbound voyages made, the names of each vessel, captain, and dates of sailing. A summary chart reveals the full scope of E. H. Derby's world wide-trade, 1785-1799, and also the periods when this trade took place.

Section VI: ~~X~~ is a catalog listing the names of 176 vessels associated with Richard Derby, Elias Hasket Derby, and the ~~the~~ latter's heirs, from

1735 to 1820. The vessels are arranged in alphabetical order and under each name is to be found its type, the years when it was associated with the Derbys, and the volumes or boxes in the Derby Family Manuscripts ^{and} ~~or~~ Derby Family Papers of the Essex Institute that contain ~~the~~ original source material on each boat. In addition to providing an documented and fairly comprehensive list of Derby vessels, it is believed that Section VI will greatly facilitate further research on ~~any~~ particular vessels or groups of vessels.

Section VII is a description and guide to the extensive ~~of~~ collections of source material relating to the Derbys that ~~is~~ available for study in the Essex Institute and Peabody Museum at Salem, Massachusetts. This portion outlines the data that is available for some future study of the mercantile operations of Richard and Elias Hasket Derby during the period 1735-1799.

The following three essays throw additional light on the data presented in sections I through VI of this report:

(1). Elias H. Derby's article, "Elias Hasket Derby," in Freeman Hunt, e d., The Lives of America Merchants (New York, 1858), Vol. II, pp. 20-28, 52-100, provides very valuable and accurate comments on Derby voyages and business methods. He used most of the Derby papers and provides addition data.

(2). Arthur K. Dacy, with revisions by Edwin W. Small, "The Derbys, Their Ships, and Shipping - A Report based on material in the Derby MSS Collection at the Essex Institute, Salem, Massachusetts," (National Park Service typescript, dated October 1938, 31 pages). The first 19 pages of this report contains ^{An} ~~an~~ accurate narrative that ~~is~~ still ~~is~~

The lists of vessels given in Appendices A to E of this report, however, are undocumented and cannot be accepted as reliable.

SECTION I

THE IMPORTANCE OF SALEM AND THE MERCHANT

ELIAS HASKET DERBY IN THE FOREIGN

COMMERCE OF THE UNITED STATES,

1784 to 1799

The foreign commerce of the United States from colonial times to 1815 was the ~~chief~~ principal trade of America and the chief source of profit. It was moneys gained from this foreign commerce that provided most of the capital needed for the further development of commerce, transportation, and manufacturing in the new Republic. Prior to 1815, the largest fortunes in the United States were made by merchants engaged in foreign commerce and these were the men who usually provided the capital and acted ^{as} central organizing agents for increased handicraft production, the domestic system, and the factory system.

After 1815, however, there was a profound ~~change~~^{shift} in the nature of American commerce. The relative importance of foreign commerce, viewed in the light of national growth, rapidly declined and was replaced by the immense rise and development of internal or domestic commerce. Thus while the total foreign commerce of the United States increased almost 16 times - from \$43,000,000 in 1790 to \$687,000,000 in 1860, the total internal commerce of the United States succeeded in reaching a grand total value estimated in the neighborhood of \$ 5,600,000,000 by 1851-2. During this period the value of American manufactures also increased from \$ 199,000,000 in 1810 to about \$ 1,858,000,000 in 1860.

FOREIGN COMMERCE, 178~~7~~ - 1815

Following the War for Independence the American merchant marine and its export trade underwent a period of severe readjustment, for American vessels and merchants were excluded from the markets of Britain, France, the Netherlands, Portugal, and Spain under the

mercantilistic economic policies followed by those countries.

The new and weak American Confederacy of 13 States was unable to retaliate in kind¹ and American merchants were thus forced to seek for markets outside of western Europe. Among the most important and successful of these merchants ~~was~~^{was} pioneering new routes and markets was Elias Hasket Derby of Salem, Massachusetts. In June 1784 he sent his brig Light Horse to St. Petersburg, Russia. His was the first American vessel to enter the Baltic and to begin the trade with Russia and Sweden. In November 1784 ~~Derby~~^{Derby} dispatched his ship Grand Turk (I) on the first trading voyage from Salem to the Cape of Good Hope, South Africa. In December 1785 he sent the Grand Turk, under the command of Captain ~~Derby~~^{Derby} Jonathan Ingersoll, from Salem via the Cape of Good Hope on the first American voyage to the Isle of France (now Mauritius) in the Indian ~~ocean~~^{ocean}. From there in 1786 ~~Derby~~^{Derby} the Grand Turk proceeded to Canton, China. Derby's ship was the first New England ~~vessel~~^{ship} and the second American vessel to reach China.¹ The Grand Turk returned to Salem with a cargo of tea, silks, and nankeens in June 1787, but even before its arrival, Derby had sent out two brigs, Light Horse and Three Sisters, for the Orient, thus beginning the American trade with the East Indies.

The first American vessel to reach port in India was the Chesapeake, from Baltimore, sometime between 1786 and 1787, ^{But Derby} was not far behind. In December 1787 he dispatched his ship Grand Turk, this time under the command of his 21 year old son, Elias H. Derby, Jr., to Isle of ~~the~~^{the} France. From there the son proceeded

to India where he remained three years and laid the foundations of the extensive trade subsequently developed by his father. In 1788 the Derby ship Peggy loaded with cotton at Bombay and then returned to Salem on June 21, 1789 with the first American cargo of Indian cotton. In 1789 Derby's vessels visited the Indian ports of Surat, Madras, and Calcutta, and also carried cotton from Bombay to Canton. ^{In 1789} His ship Astrea, commanded by Captain James Magee, also called at Rangoon and was the first American vessel to visit Siam. This new trade with Asia and the East Indies was a source of very large profits to a few American merchants.

In this search for new American markets, John Kendrick in the Columbia and Robert Gray in the Lady Washington, both out of Boston, September 30, 1787, were the first American vessels to visit the Pacific Northwest coast in 1788 and also the Russian waters off Alaska, where they began the trade with the Indians and Russians for otter skins. On August 9, 1790, the Columbia, commanded by Captain Robert Gray, returned to Boston after having completed the first American voyage around the world. Finally, in 1796 Elias Hasket Derby's ship Astrea, II, made the first American visit to Manilia in the Philippines. ²

After 1789, however, the new Federal Government of the United States, aided by the outbreak of the French Revolution and war in Europe, was able to reopen western European markets to American merchants on favorable terms. During the Napoleonic Wars that raged in Europe from 1795 to 1815, the British, Dutch, French, and Spanish merchant marines were largely destroyed by the warring powers.

The United States, acting as a neutral in this terrible contest, impartially sold goods to both sides. In this ~~process~~ process the American merchant and marine engrossed most of the carrying trade between Europe ~~and~~ the French and Spanish colonies in the Western Hemisphere, between Great Britain and Canada and the West Indies, most of the trade between Europe and South Africe, India, the East ~~Indies~~ Indies, and China. This "Golden Age" of American commerce lasted from 1795 to December 1807, when President Thomas Jefferson's Federal embargo halted all American foreign trade for 15 months and then the War of 1812 stopped all trade except from prizes of the American privateers for nearly three years.

During this period of unparalleled prosperity, American tonnage registered for the foreign trade jumped from 123,893 tons in 1789 to 1,089,000 by 1808 and the percentage of the value of all goods in transit to the United States, carried by American vessels, increased from 40.5 percent in 1790 to 90 percent by 1795, and amounted to 92 percent in 1807. Similarly, the combined export-import trade of the United States leaped from \$ 43,000,000 in 1790 to \$246,000,000 ~~in~~ by 1807.

More than 10 percent of the total American tonnage registered for the foreign trade in 1790, e.g. 13,726 tons and 124 vessels, came from the port of Salem, Massachusetts, then a city of about 9,000.³

Elias Hasket Derby's dominating role in Salem's mercantile

efforts in the foreign commerce is revealed by the following facts:

From June 1, 1785 to the end of August 1799, Elias Hasket Derby employed 107 different masters and 90 different vessels to make a grand total of at least 282 recorded voyages⁹ from and to Derby Wharf.

Of this recorded total, 173 were in the foreign trade and 104 were in the coastal trade. Of the foreign commerce voyages, 16 were with Africa, 8 with Maderia, 39 with Asia (China, East Indies and India), with 37 were ~~at~~¹⁰ ports in Northern Europe, 34 with Southern Europe, and 43 were ~~at~~¹¹ with ports in the West Indies and South America. At his death on September 8, 1799, Elias Hasket Derby left an estate worth \$ 990,832.75 more than ~~\$ 777,333~~, which was one of the largest fortunes amassed in the United States up to this date.

The Reverend William Bent~~T~~ey, on the occasion of Derby's death commented in his diary on the merchant's fleet and economic influence on Salem as follows:

This (14 vessels) must at the Lowest estimation be employment for 100 men, besides ~~boys~~, in only the peace establishment of navigation, & excluding Artificers, merchants, & servants in pay. This is a large stock," Bentley noted," to withdraw from the Trade of a single Town, being in the first instance 1/90 of its whole population (of about 9,000)."¹²

Salem and the Foreign Commerce of the United States, 1808-1860

After the depression in foreign commerce caused by the Embargo and War of 1812, American foreign ~~foreign~~ trade again expanded. The total foreign trade of the United States reached on average of \$186,000,000 a year for the period 1816-20, and then more than trebled by 1860, when it averaged \$616,000,000 a year for the period 1856-60. American tonnage registered for the foreign trade also increased from 674,633 tons in 1814 to 2,379,390 tons in 1860. During this same period, however, the percentage of value of foreign trade goods carried in American vessels dropped from 92.5 percent in 1826 to ~~to~~ only 66.5 percent by 1860. This latter trend indicated that the American merchant marine was beginning to lose its grip on the foreign carrying trade of the United States.

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As in colonial times, agriculture contained to supply about 80 percent of the products exported to foreign countries. Goods manufactured in the United States, however, increased their total percentage in foreign trade from about 7 percent in 1810 to approximately 12 percent by 1860. Altogether, the Southern staples—unmanufactured cotton, tobacco, and rice — provided 61 percent of the total goods exported in 1860.

The relative trend and importance of the leading domestic exports, from 1770 to 1821, is shown on Chart No. 1. The chief customers of American merchants, both for export and import trade, were Great Britain, the West Indies, France, Cuba, South America, Canada, and Germany, in that order. The trend of this foreign commerce is shown on Charts No. 2 and 3.

Banks, Insurance, and Elias Hasket Derby

From colonial times to 1860, the balance of payments in the foreign commerce of the United States favored the Northern merchants, who owned and operated the shipping, and marketed the goods. As a result of their extensive trading activities the merchants of Philadelphia, New York City, Boston, Charleston, S.C., Newport, R.I., and Salem, Mass., accumulated considerable amounts of fluid and surplus capital that they actively employed in the further expansion of commerce and the development of industry. The merchant-capitalists were particularly important in this role because there were no banks or bankers in the United States prior to 1780.¹⁵ In addition, after 1784, these merchant-capitalists also provided much of the insurance and credit.¹⁶

The next two banks, the Massachusetts Bank at Boston~~X~~ and Bank of New York at New York City, were both chartered in 1784. By 1798 there was a grand total of 22 banks with a total authorized capital of about \$ 15,250,000 in the United States. The chief functions of these banks was to ~~provide~~ provide merchants with credit for financing the expanding foreign commerce. Twelve of these banks were located in New England, eight were in the Middle States, and two in the Southern States. The first bank was incorporated in Salem, Mass., in 1803. By 1811 the United States had a total of 89 banks.

Prior to 1790 American ship owners had purchased most of their marine insurance in Great Britain. In 1794 the Insurance Company of North America, with an authorized capital of \$ 600,000 and headquarters at Philadelphia, was chartered by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Marine insurance thereafter multiplied rapidly. By 1800 there were 33 such companies in the United States; 15 of these were located in New England, seven ^{W.C.A.} ~~were~~ in Pennsylvania, and 11 were in the South.

Elias Hasket Derby played a role as a merchant-capitalist. He loaned large sums of money to the Massachusetts government to finance the War for Independence and later to help launch the Federal Government under the new constitution.

Writing to Congressman Benjamin ~~Goodhue~~ Goodhue on February 3, 1790, Derby mentioned: "At the ~~time~~ time of Lexington battle(1775), I loaned to government a large proportion of the supplies for the army, and took their obligations for \$1 so much specie, which obligations I have by me...." In the summer of 1778 when Major General John Sullivan marched a force of 7,000 Massachusetts militia to Rhode Island in an effort to retake Newport, Derby supplied the American troops with boats to cross from the mainland to the island on which Newport stands, and later also supplied the French fleet involved in the same campaign with coal.

MARITIME TERMS/DEFINITIONS of TYPES OF SAILING VESSELS

1. SHIP: A sailing vessel square rigged on all of three or more masts, having jibes, staysails, and a spanker on the aftermast mast.
2. BRIG: A two-masted sailing vessel, square-rigged on both masts with a gaff spanker on the main mast. Brigs have been used as cargo ships and also, in the past, as small warships that carried about 10 guns. They varied in length between 75 and 130 feet, with tonnages up to 350.
3. BRIGANTINE: A somewhat smaller vessel than a brig, but also two masted and squared rigged on the foremast with a fore and aft main sail. In earlier times it carried a square topsail on the main mast.
4. Bark or Barque: Sailing vessel with three masts. The main mast and the foremast are square rigged; the mizzen mast is fore and aft rigged. Though once the word was used to mean any small boat, the modern bark may be quite large (up to 6,000 tons). A fourmasted bark is a four masted ship that is fore and aft rigged on the aftermast.
5. Schooner: Sailing vessel, rigged fore-and-aft. It may have from two to seven masts. Schooners can be closer to the wind than square rigged sailing vessels, need smaller crews, and are very fast. They were first constructed in Colonial America, and because of their speed became one of the favorite craft of America and Canada in the latter half of the 18th and the first half of the 19th century. Schooners were widely used in the North Atlantic fisheries and the American and Canadian coastal trade until the First World War. (See Howard E. Chapelle, History of American Sailing Ship, 1935).

6. SLOOPS: Fore-and-aft rigged single-masted sailing vessel with ~~had~~ a single headsail jib, differing from a cutter in that it has a jib stay - a support leading from the bow to the masthead in which the jib is set. A sloop of war was a small warship, variously rigged, as a barque, brig, brigantine, or ship, that carried fewer than 18 guns in the British Navy fewer than 24 in the America. These vessels played an active role in the American Revolution and the French Revolutionary Wars. The sloop disappeared as a warship in the mid-19th century.

7. KETCHES: A vessel equipped with two masts, namely, the mainmast and mizzenmast, and usually from 100 to 250 tons burden. Formerly the term ketch was applied to a two-masted square rigged vessel with the mainmast stepped amidships.

8. SNOWS: A sailing vessel rigged in the manner similar to a brig but with atrysail just aft the mainmast.

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The principal trade routes of the period 1784-1815 were across the North Atlantic, to the West Indies, and to South America, as in colonial times. To Portugal, Spain, and France in Southern Europe the Northern States sent fish and lumber, which were sold for coin, bills of exchange, or southern European produce. These proceeds were then carried to Great Britain and there used to pay for northern imports of British manufactured goods.

To the Canary and Madeira Islands the northern merchants sent fish, lumber and provisions, which were exchanged for wine. Part of the wine was carried back to the United States and part was shipped to Great Britain, where its sale enabled the northern traders to obtain additional purchasing power for British manufactured goods.

An even more important trade was carried on between the northern merchants and the West Indies. Northern exports to these islands consisted of fish, horses, lumber, wheat, flour, biscuit, beef, pork, bacon, peas, and Indian corn. For this they received coin, sugar, molasses, rum, indigo, dyewoods, fustic, cotton, wool, and salt. The West Indies also paid for imports with bills of exchange drawn on English merchants. Most of those commodities were shipped to England and there exchanged for English manufactured goods. Rum and molasses were carried back to the northern states where they were used in the fur trade, the slave trade, the New England fishery, and the Newfoundland trade — in each instance enabling the northerners to obtain additional remittances to Great Britain. The northern merchants further increased their buying power by earning freight charges and profits on the cargoes they carried directly to Great Britain from the West Indies, the Canary Islands, Madeira, and Southern Europe.

In addition, as has been noted, new routes, 1784-1789, were opened with the Baltic, South Africa, India, the Dutch East Indies, China, and the Pacific Coast of North America.

Elias Hasket Derby ~~and~~ was one of the chief merchants and ship-owners engaged in the foreign commerce of the United States between 1785 and 1799. The following resources are available for a study of his and his father's, Richard Derby's, business careers:

A. Letter Books of Richard and Elias Hasket Derby, 1760-1800

The library of the Peabody Museum, Salem, Mass., has in its manuscript collection ~~four~~ four letter books that contain copies of the outgoing business

~~correspondence~~ correspondence of Richard Derby, Elias Hasket Derby, and Elias Hasket Derby, Jr. A brief description follows:

1. Richard Derby's Letter Book, 1760-71: Contains copies of business letters written to other merchants for the years 1760-65, 1767 (one letter), ~~1770~~, and 1771.

2. Elias Hasket Derby's Letter Book, December 1783 to October 1788

Indexed by name and containing 262 pages, this volume has copies of his outgoing business letters to merchants in Europe, Africa, India, China, and the East Indies.

3. Elias Hasket Derby's Letter Book, April 15, 1796 to August 22, 1799: Indexed by name and containing 124 pages, this book has copies of his outgoing business letters to merchants all over the world.

4. Elias Hasket Derby, Jr.'s Letter Book, August 5, 1799 to May 8, 1800:

Has copies of his outgoing business letters, and accounts of sales and Gilbraltar, made at Leghorn, Italy, in 1799 for the three ships Mount Vernon, Nancy, and Lucy.

D. ACCOUNT BOOKS OF ELIAS HASKET DERBY, 1769-1799:

The Essex Institute has in its collections 10 record books keep for Elias Hasket Derby during the period 1769 to 1799. These are as follows:

Vol. 8- Account Book for period 1795-1800, 111 pages and indexed by name and accounts. This index gives the account number assigned to each individual or project listed in Volumes No. 4, 6, 7, and 8, and thus provides the chief key to business transactions of the period 1785 to 1800. Individuals are identified as to trade and occupation.

Vol. I, Ledger, covers period 1769-1800. ~~about 200~~ pages, this book has ~~copy~~ ²⁸⁶ copies of invoices submitted to Elias Derby for what services were rendered payment. Included are bills ~~for~~ from his carpenter, ~~etc.~~, masons, and laborers for services rendered.

VOL. II, Ledger, covers period 1772-79, 1785-1790, and 1793-96:

~~About~~ 416 pages, this volume contains the balancing of accounts with individuals during the periods indicated above. Individuals are identified as to trade or occupation, the services they have rendered are listed, including the dates and also how much and when they were paid.

Vol. 10: Account Book for period 1779-1784: This volume, 25 pages, is unnumbered and is filed in Volume VII, page 33, of the Derby Family Manuscripts. It contains same type of data as listed under Vol. II.

Vol. IV ~~Ledger~~ for Period May 1786 to July 31, 1795: 614 pages, this volume contains the balancing of account with individuals as in Volume II and provides similar data on services rendered, etc.

Elias Hasket Derby's Letter Books for the periods 1765 to November 1783 and from November 1788 to April 14, 1796 are not to be found in the collections of either the Peabody Museum or the Essex Institute. The writer, however, has found some evidence that suggests that these two or three volumes may still exist and be in the possession of Richard Derby family of ~~New York City~~, Oyster Bay, N.Y.

B. Incoming business Correspondence of Richard and Elias H. Derby, 1735-1800:

The incoming Business letters of Richard and Elias H. Derby ~~are~~ from merchants all over the world during the period 1735 to 1800 ~~are~~ is to be found in the 34 volumes of the Derby Family Manuscripts and four boxes of Derby Family Papers of the collections of the Essex Institute, Salem, Mass.

outward bound voyages from Salem by Derby vessels during the period JUNE 1, 1785 to MARCH 21, 1796. Containing 266 pages, the index lists the name of each vessel, its destination, and the name of its master.

Volume IX. Invoices listing the cargoes carried on 35 outward bound voyages from Salem by Derby vessels during the period June 1796 to August 22, 1799. Containing 75 pages, the index to this volume also lists the name of each vessel, its destination, and the name of the master.

Together Volumes III and IX provide what must be a virtually complete record of Elias Hasket Derby's ~~various~~ outward bound world-wide voyages trading ~~abroad~~ from June 1785 to August 22, 1799. Cargoes, names of vessels and masters, types of vessels, destination, and dates of loading are listed. Utilizing these volumes it would be possible to reconstruct when and what vessels were serviced at Derby Wharf every year during this period.

This complete inventory contains a room by room listing of the furnishings of his mansion and outbuildings on Essex Street, of the rooms in his farmhouse at Danvers, and of his warehouses on Derby Wharf. The data on real estate has been published, but nothing has yet been printed relating to his personal belongings.

Also "Memorandum of Articles Bought at the (Mansion) House, Farm, and Stores," dated July 2, 1800. This document is a detailed accounting and list of the various Elias Hasket Derby items that were purchased by his seven children. Not published.

F. DERBY FAMILY MANUSCRIPTS, 34 Volumes, in the Collections
of the Essex Institute, Salem, Mass.

Each of these volumes is about 12 inches wide and 30 inches long and contains from about 100 to 147 usually numbered pages. Each page has from one to 30 documents pasted on its top face. Where there are many manuscripts on one page, these are arranged in layers and rows on that page. Items are generally filed in chronological order within each volume, but this chronology repeats itself in many other volumes. Thus data relating to an item found in Volume I may also turn up in Volumes X and XXX.

General: It can be safely said that Richard Derby and his son Elias Hasket hardly ever threw away a slip of paper on which they had jotted down figures or notes. This vast collection probably contains almost every receipt, bill, or invoice they ever issued or received, be it for 2 cents or \$1,000, during the period 1747 to 1799. The volumes incoming contain hundreds of letters from merchants and agents in Europe, Africa, India,, China, and the United States regarding trading activities. There are, however, not more than three or four copies of Derby out-going correspondence. The fiscal records include bills and receipts for all merchantile operations, the building and maintenance of their ships, the purchase of real estate, the construction and maintenance of residences, farms, warehouses, wharves. Shipping papers, insurance papers, sailing orders, invoices of cargo, and accounts of sales and expenses for the vessels are included. There are copies of the agreements with the captains and crews that provide data on terms of service, wages, as well as the size of crew and names of the sailors.

There are records of furnishings, books, and clothing purchased. architect, baker, of the amounts paid and services received for education, to the ~~black~~ barber, candle maker, carpenter, doctor, cooper, iron worker, mason, painter, sailmaker, shoemaker, tailor, wagoner, tanner, etc., etc. The only missing items are plans of vessels and buildings. The plans of structures that were once filed in these 34 volumes, ~~black~~ together with architectural the many related/bills for services rendered, have been removed and refilled in the Samuel McIntire Collection of the Essex Institute.
