
# Timpanogos Cave National Monument

#### CAVE TOUR

The Timpanogos Cave system is three small, but highly decorated, limestone caves. Guided Tour tickets must be purchased tours thru the three interconnected caves are provided by National Park Service Rangers. Since the average cave temper-sture is 43° F (6° C), a light jacket or sweater is advisable.

Tours are provided on a first-

come, first-served basis with a limit of 20 people per tour. at the visitor center before starting to the caves. are: Adults (16-61) \$3.00 Children (6-15) \$2.00 Children (under 6) FREE \$1.50 Senior Citizens w/Golden Age Passport.

## CAVE TRAIL

To reach Timpanogos Cave, vis- walking or breathing problems. itors must hike the  $1\frac{1}{2}$  mile cave trail. This hard surfaced trail, rising 1,065', is pets and wheeled vehicles, considered a strenuous hike and should not be attempted by anyone with heart trouble,

#### CAVE SEASON

Cave tour tickets may be purchased:

Most Saturdays and Holidays more visitors want cave tours than the cave will hold. Often all available tour tickets are sold by early tour afternoon and some visitors

Even must be turned away. those visitors who are able to buy a ticket often wait several hours before they can start to the caves. We recommend an early arrival.


#### SAFETY

### **GETTING HERE**

From Salt Lake City:


Visitors arriving from Salt Lake City travel south on I-15 to exit 287 (Alpine Exit) then turn east on SR92 and proceed 10 miles to the monument.

From Provo:

Travelers driving north on I-15 are advised to exit at American Fork. At the first light make a left turn on State Street At the second light, make a right turn on SR74. At the first 4-way stop sign, make a right turn on SR92, heading east to the monument in American Fork Canyon.

From Heber City/Provo Canyon:

Those arriving from the east via US 40 or US 189 may take SR92 west, passing over the mountainous scenic route known as the Alpine Scenic Loop Highway. Buses and vehicles over 30 feet are advised to travel US 189 through Provo Canyon to 8th North (SR52), then west to US 89. Follow US 89 north to SR146 in Pleasant Grove, north to SR92, then east on SR92 to the monument.



# VISITOR SERVICES

Visitor Center -

Cave tour ticket sales, information, exhibits, 12 minute slide program, and book sales.

Snack bar & Gifts -

Located at the west end of the visitor center provides food, beverages, film, sweatshirts and souvenirs.

Picnic Area -

Located 1/4 mile west of the visitor center, 16 sites, fire grills, water and restrooms.

Campgrounds -

No campgrounds are located in the National Monument; however, there are several campgrounds in the adjacent Uinta National Forest.
