Passes are available at the information contact stations, and U.S. Forest Service and National Park Service offices. Canyon Passes may be purchased in advance at www.recreation.gov. Valid pass must be displayed in your vehicle.

Canyon Recreation Annual Pass



Allows recreating and use of facilities in American Fork Canyon, along the Alpine Loop and at Mirror Lake Highway. May be purchased at the information contact stations, the Pleasant Grove Ranger District Office, or at www.recreation.gov. Non-transferable.

Wet Trail Closure



This trail is too wet to ride.

Each spring certain trails in American Fork Canyon are open to hikers only, until they dry out. Watch for the bright green signs located at the beginning of the trails.

Riding wet trails causes short and long-term damage. This damage is costly to repair, and in some cases may change the trail permanently.

Please respect the wet trail closure while it is in effect. Even after the wet trail closure is lifted. please remember to wait a day or two after rainstorms to allow trails to dry.

Hiking

•If you are planning to hike Mount Timpanogos, you can avoid trail and parking congestion by planning your hike Sunday-Friday and by avoiding holidays.

•Walking around wet or muddy areas creates unwanted parallel trails. Stick to the main trail to avoid damaging the surrounding vegetation.


•Shortcutting switchbacks leads to extensive erosion, trail damage, injuries, and rarely saves time. Stay on the trail. Remember, <u>you</u> are responsible for your own safety.

•When encountering equestrian users, you should stop and move to the downhill side, and talk to the rider as they pass.



Your Fees at Work - A Snapshot

Summer 2023

Theater-in-the Pines historic amphitheater received a face-lift with installation of information kiosks, split bench seating, and repairs to the existing staircase that leads to the stage.

An increase in graffiti throughout American Fork Canyon led to a creative solution to deter this type of vandalism. Forest Service personnel worked with a local artist who painted a beautiful mural in the restroom at the popular Pine Hollow trailhead. Watch for additional murals in other restrooms.

Forest Service personnel along with volunteers removed several truckloads of water cress from Cascade Springs. Watercress is an invasive species that chokes out native plants and reduces habitat for the reintroduced, native Bonneville Cutthroat Trout. Removal of this plant helps to restore balance to this unique ecosystem.

Personnel at information stations, located in American Fork Canyon and Aspen Grove along the Alpine Scenic Backway, provide visitors maps, information, and a variety of recreation passes. As you approach the stations, avoid blocking the through lane, continue to your destination, and self-pay. Enjoy your experience on the national forest!




Visiting Timpanogos Cave National Monument

Trail - A strenuous 1.5 mile hike is necessary to reach the Timpanogos Caves. Those under 16 years old must be accompanied by an adult. The cave trail can be used for hiking when the cave is open, even if you don't intend to take a tour.

Cave tours - Visitors cannot enter the caves without a ticket. Purchasing tickets in advance is recommended to assure a spot, as tours regularly sell out. A few same-day tickets may be available at the visitor center each morning. For more information, visit www.nps.gov/tica.

Picnics - Picnic areas across from the visitor center and 1/4 mile down canyon are available for free; first come, first served.




"Are you wearing or carrying anything that has been in ANY cave or mine?"

Help stop the spread of Whitenose syndrome, which has already killed millions of bats across America.

Items that have been inside other caves or mines cannot enter Timpanogos Cave System.

If items have been in another cave or mine, see a ranger for decontamination procedures.



Mountain Biking

- Riding in control and managing speed at all times will reduce the potential for trail conflicts. Alert others to your presence.
- When encountering equestrian users, you should stop and move to the downhill side, remove your helmet, and talk to the rider as they pass.
- Building new trails or trail structures is prohibited.

ATV/UTV

- All of the routes open to ATV/UTVs in American Fork Canyon are roads that are also open to full size vehicles. For everyone's safety keep your speeds low and stay in control.
- Riding off designated roads on OHVs to retrieve game is not allowed.
- Help maintain road conditions by not spinning circles on roads and in parking lots. Repairs are costly and damage is often irreversible.

Dogs

Dogs are allowed in the Alpine Loop area. In order to protect this privilege:

- Keep this watershed clean by packing out all dog waste.
- Keep your dog on leash while hiking in highly trafficked areas and in developed recreation sites.
- Dogs are not allowed on the Timpanogos Cave Trail.

Equestrian Users

- Weed-free hay is required to reduce the spread of noxious weeds.
- It is your responsibility to clean up after your animal at trailheads by removing manure or by scattering it off the parking area.
- Help others to know what to do around your horse, and how to pass to keep everyone safe.

Fire

- Before starting a fire, check local fire restrictions. Fires must be in designated fire rings or rock rings.
- Fires must never be left unattended. Assure your fire is out cold to the touch before you leave it.
- Collecting live vegetation and standing dead wood is prohibited.

Motorcycles

- Motorcycles geared for high speeds are not ideal for single track use. Reducing speed prevents trail damage, and the potential for conflict with other users.
- To avoid trail damage remember all trails are closed when wet. Drive over (not around) obstacles. Avoid roosting on switchbacks and when climbing, and refrain from brake sliding when descending.
- When encountering equestrian users, stop and move to the downhill side, remove your helmet, and talk to the rider as they pass.
- Motorcyclists yield to all other users. Try Pine Hollow, Summit, or Elk Camp trailheads to access trails.

OHV Rules and Regs

- Routes are closed to motorized use unless posted open on the ground or designated open on the Motor Vehicle Use Map (MVUM).
- To avoid road damage remember to travel at reduced speeds when wet. Drive over (not around) obstacles. Avoid roosting on corners and fishtailing.
- OHVs must have a clearly visible current registration sticker.
- All OHVs are required to have a muffler and a spark arrester.
- Keep speeds low around crowds, in parking lots, and camping areas.
- All riders under 18 must wear a DOT approved helmet.

- Riders age 8-15 may operate with an Education Certificate issued by Utah State Parks and Recreation. No one under age 8 may operate an OHV.
- Operators 16 years or older may use a valid drivers license or an Education Certificate issued by Utah State Parks and Recreation.

Shooting

- Shooting is not allowed within 150 yards of a residence, building, campsite, developed recreation site, trail, or occupied area, or shooting across or on a road or body of water
- Shooting is not allowed in any circumstance whereby any person may be injured or property damaged.
- Failing to dispose of all garbage, shells, and other materials constitutes a violation of the law. If a wildland fire is started due to the discharge of firearms, individual may be held accountable for the entire suppression cost of the fire.
