HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE GORGE

FALL IS PRESCRIBED BURNING SEASON

With fall here, our fire crews hope to get in **prescribed burns** in the eastern Gorge. This controlled, low intensity fire helps manage "fuels" by clearing ground vegetation and accumulated woody debris from the forest understory. Other benefits include restoring **historic landscapes**, improving **wildlife habitat**, reducing **smoke** from future wildfire, recycling **soil nutrients**, and increasing **resiliency** of treated stands to the effects of wildfire.

This year's focus includes land east of Bingen/White Salmon and west of the Klickitat River in Washington. Actual ignition day(s) are selected when factors such as humidity, wind speed and direction, temperature and moisture levels are right. We've been working with the **Port of Cascade Locks** to develop a proposal for a **15-mile**, **multi-use trail system** near **Cascade Locks**. The proposed system would expand beginner and intermediate mountain biking and equestrian opportunities in the scenic area.

Our recreation folks will provide an update at the **Port of Cascade Locks Commission** meeting on **October 17**.

Our trail crew happily spread their work across the scenic area's geographical richness this past week: helping our hydrologist with **Best Management Practice Monitoring** along the Starvation Creek Trail, removing a **windfallen tree** on the **Klickitat Trail**, cutting tread on wildfire-damaged trails in the **Hatfield Wilderness**, stabilizing a portion of the **BZ Portage Trail**, critically assessing the integrity of various wooden trail bridges, mapping a proposed re-route, and staunching the cutting of **switchbacks** on mountain-bike trails in the **Coyote Wall** area.


OFFICE WITH A VIEW

Build in enough time to upload and prepare all your documentation!
