# Welcome to Voyageurs National Park

Located on Minnesota's border with Canada, Voyageurs' 218,000 acres include four major lakes and thirty smaller inland lakes that together make up more than a third of the total park area. Voyageurs is a water based park, but you may experience it in a multitude of ways ~ by canoe, kayak, motorboat, tour boat, houseboat, visiting a visitor center or on foot.

Voyageurs is located in the southern tip of the northern boreal forest. During the first weekend in June the peak migration of birds occurs and the largest diversity of wood warblers north of Mexico gather in this extraordinary habitat. We invite you to come and experience the beauty of spring in this beautiful national park.

Before or after the Rendezvous stroll along one of the 8 hiking trails in Voyageurs National Park and explore the wonderful diversity of flora and fauna the park has to offer. You can reach four of the trails by car; the other four are accessible by watercraft.

#### **Visitor Centers**

Visit any one of the 3 visitor centers the park has to offer and you will find a variety of things to see and do. The Rainy Lake Visitor Center is located at the north end of the park, and Kabetogama Lake Visitor Center and Ash River Visitor Center are located near the middle of the park. #### Registration
