# Blazing Trails, Building Friendships

The project not only provided an important service to the Park and its visitors, but was an important step in forging real partnerships among VNPA, the Park, the Kabetogama Tourism Bureau and other Park stakeholders. There is perhaps no better way to cement a working relationship than with s'mores around a campfire after a day working together to protect and improve a treasured resource.

#### We need your feet!

Building on that tremendous success, volunteers are needed the weekend of September 29 through October 1 to continue the work begun last spring. The weekend will be a chance to visit the Park, enjoy the fall colors, meet some like-minded fans of Voyageurs and help with light trail work.

No previous trail maintenance experience is necessary; each trail crew will be guided and trained by an experienced leader. All work will be done with hand tools, which will be provided.

Volunteers should bring personal safety gear (work gloves, goggles, boots) and be physically fit for a four-mile round-trip hike and a moderate work day.

The weekend won't be all work, though. Ample time will be set aside for campfires, socializing and exploring the Park.

help and the forest is always eager to reclaim sections of the Park's trail system. Please consider joining us for the fall trail weekend. 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# Hike the Kab-Ash Trail...tell a friend

Thanks to a Public Land Corps Grant the Park received in late spring, an energetic team from the Minnesota Conservation Corps continued the trail clearing work started by volunteers in May. Through these joint efforts, the entire 25 mile Kab-Ash Trail is again accessible and safe for hiking. The best way to maintain a trail in the long term is for visitors to experience its splendor, so share the news and plan to hike the Kab-Ash Trail on your next visit to Voyageurs National Park.

The Kab-Ash Trail runs primarily through recommended wilderness. Four separate access points and several loops give hikers the option of hiking the full length of the trail or shorter sections.

# Voyageurs National Park Community Trust Survey Results Released

A series of public workshops on July 18–19 in International Falls, Crane Lake and Kabetogama opened the door to the future at Voyageurs National Park. These meetings delivered the findings from a University of Minnesota Community Trust Survey initiated through collaboration between Voyageurs National Park, Koochiching and St. Louis Counties, the City of International Falls, Friends of Voyageurs National Park and Voyageurs National Park Association.

The workshops were informal and scheduled in and around Park neighboring communities to provide everyone a chance to participate. Kind support by the Voyageurs National Park Association provided juice, coffee and cookies. Meeting locations were provided through generous assistance in each community.

Each meeting started with a welcome from Superintendent Kate Miller followed by each participant's self introduction. Dr. Dorothy Anderson from the University of Minnesota presented a slideshow summary of the survey findings, and the remainder of the time was spent gathering feedback to questions distilled from the survey results. Voyageurs National Park asked their neighbors, friends and skeptics to provide their views on these questions:

• What should the Park's role be in the economic and social future of the region?

• How can relations and communications be improved between the Park and the local communities?

All comments were recorded for consideration. The tone of the meetings was positive and supportive. These questions were developed to ask specifically how Voyageurs National Park can be a better listener.

Participants were quick to agree that there appears to be some mystery about how Voyageurs National Park operates. Folks wanted to know more about what issues face the Park and also what they could do to help.

Many comments were specific suggestions of ways for Voyageurs to provide information about the Park, its issues and people. All agreed that the Park is an important asset for the region.

There was agreement to look forward and work harder at

building relationships to keep growing trust. The workshops were more than a release of survey results. They were an important step in helping Voyageurs National Park listen to their neighbors, friends and supporters.

### Survey Says...

According to a recent article in the *Tower Timberjay News*, survey respondents said:

- The Park complemented the area with the recreational opportunities and the environmental protections it provided, but the Park could do more to help the local economy.
- They have difficulty trusting the Park.
- They put economic interests and environmental concerns on equal footing.

## Changing of the Board

Earlier this year, VNPA members elected Leni Darrow, Jim Hudson and Greg Seitz to the Board of Directors.

This summer, Jim stepped down temporarily from the board to serve as interim Executive Director while Cory MacNulty was on maternity leave. VNPA is very grateful to Jim for all of his help.

Greg Seitz received his bachelor's degree in English from the University of Minnesota. He lives in St. Paul and works in Eagan at Thomson West doing corporate communications, largely focused on employee communications and Web development. # A Report From the Birders' Rendezvous

The first week of June, six VNPA members traveled to Voyageurs to participate in the annual Birders' Rendezvous that is traditionally held that weekend.

Early June is an ideal time to bird in the Park because the approximately 80 species that live in the area, at least part of the year, are augmented by about 160 more species that are migrating through on their spring journey north.

The event ran from late Friday afternoon through Sunday noon, and during this time there were a series of organized events to fill the plate of both serious and casual birders and Park visitors.

This year these events included 11 birding outings (some on foot, some on the water). The outings were led by extremely knowledgeable and experienced birders, including several Park personnel.

Friday evening featured a social hour and speaker event. On Saturday morning, the six of us did a forest walk on the Tilson Creek trail with about twelve other people plus two leaders.

The traditional Saturday lunch at Park headquarters provided another chance to meet more interesting people and compare notes on what everybody did and saw at their morning event.

After lunch, we joined Chris Holbeck, Chief of Resource Management, and a few others in visiting birding 'hot spots' in Rainy Lake via boat. Our hot spots included:

- Bald Eagle eaglets on the nest
- A cormorant rookery island where these birds and Ringbilled Gulls, usually enemies, were raising their respective young close together during breeding season when they observe a cease fire toward each other. These observations were all made using binoculars from an appropriate distance.

At sunset on Saturday, we enjoyed a cruise on Rainy Lake. Other events this year included classes on birdcalls and wild edible plants.

Birding in the northern forest is largely a 'hearing event' where usually more birds are heard than seen. The one disappointment for this author was not hearing the Winter Wren. Our leaders and others on the walk often recognized and called out the bird from hearing its song. The House Wren, common in the Twin Cities, I know and love well, both by song and visual antics. However, at my current age (let's just say 60-plus years) my hearing "ain't what it use to be," and, not knowing the Winter Wren's song, when someone called out "there is a Winter Wren," I was not aware I was hearing anything other than the normal forest noises.

However, nobody fails a walk or class at the Birders' Rendezvous, and repeating from year to year is strongly encouraged and rewarded. So I will just have to go back and listen for my elusive wren.

### From the Archives:

The cover story in the August 1976 VNPA newsletter concerned the issue of floatplane landings on interior lakes of the Park.

A public hearing on the matter saw debate between pilots and proposal opponents who saw the landings and low flights as a threat to the wilderness nature of the Park.

The 2001 general management plan set Park policy regarding the use of fixed-wing aircraft in Voyageurs. Private aircraft are allowed on the four major lakes and seven interior lakes including Locator, War Club, Quill, Loiten, Shoepack, Little Trout and Mukooda.

# Spiny Waterfleas Found in Rainy Lake

The invasive species called spiny waterfleas (*Bythotrephes longimanus*) were found in Rainy Lake in late July.

Spiny waterfleas can spread when boats and fishing gear become contaminated with egg-laden females. Although the females might die between fishing trips, they might be carrying resting eggs that can begin a new infestation.

Spiny waterfleas can foul angling gear, causing anglers to lose hooked fish. They also compete with small fish for the same zooplankton; small fish generally do not eat them due to their long spiny tails; and they can shift the natural balance of a lake's plankton community, disrupting food web dynamics.

Before leaving the water access, boaters and anglers should:

- Learn to recognize spiny waterfleas
- Inspect and remove aquatic plants and animals
- Drain water from livewells, bait containers, and bilge
- Dispose of unwanted live bait in the trash
- Spray with high pressure or hot tap water
- Report new sightings

The Minnesota DNR is working to designate Rainy Lake as an infested water. The designation means it will be illegal to transport water or harvest bait from the lake, similar to zebra mussel-infested waters.
