WASHINGTON MONUMENT MEMORIAL STONES

This pamphlet is designed for your assistance as you walk down the stairs.

Most people can walk down the 897 steps (50 flights) with little or no difficulty, as long as they do not overextend themselves. Benches are provided periodically but there are no facilities. For your own safety, please heed all signs and stay clear of the elevator shaft.

The Washington National Monument Society initally sponsored construction of the Monument. Monies were raised via contribution, but the State of Alabama offered a stone to be placed in the monument itself. The idea appealed to the Society, and consequently, they invited states, associations, municipalities, and later foreign governments to contribute inscribed stones. A variety of stones were installed between 1848 and 1936, excluding the years 1854 to 1880 when work halted due to political and financial problems.

A total of 192 stones were donated to the Society, but only 189 were installed in the shaft of the Monument. The Pope Stone, given by Pope Pious IX, was stolen by the Know-Nothings, a political party hostile to Catholics and foreign-born Americans, and it is believed they dumped it into the Potomac River. Another stone, from the Tomb of Napolean the Great, sent by France, was seen in the Brooklyn Navy Yard in 1861 but has never been relocated. A third stone, from the ruins of Carthage, disappeared in the mid-nineteenth century and was relocated in 1959 during the installation of the present elevator. It now rests in the north stairwell between the 500 and 490 ft. levels.
