News Along the Trail

Pedaling (and Finding) our Parks and Trails

The Schuylkill River National Heritage Area (SCRV) recently collaborated with four national park areas and a variety of community groups and public agencies for a bicycle tour in Southeastern Pennsylvania. The event was part of the Schuylkill River Trail Bike Tour Series. National Park Service (NPS) staff, interns, and volunteers from Hopewell Furnace National Historic Site (HOFU), Valley Forge National Historical Park (VAFO), Independence National Historic Park, Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary route National Historic Trail (WARO) and partner staff from the Schuylkill River National Heritage Area (SCRV) hosted "Pedaling through Our National Parks" on September 20 and 21. The collaboration among NPS units, partners and sponsors covered about 30 miles per day from Morgantown to Philadelphia. The event began at HOFU with a welcome from Superintendent Edie Shean-Hammond. Among the riders were WARO Superintendent Joe DiBello and VAFO Superintendent Kate Hammond. The riders then pedaled along the Schuylkill River Trail about 10 miles away to SCRV headquarters in Pottstown for a riverside lunch before beginning the second leg of the day's journey to VAFO for an introduction by the

Superintendent Kate Hammond, followed by a ranger-led interpretive program. Day two began at VAFO and Joe DiBello accompanied the riders along the Schuylkill River Trail to Philadelphia. The cyclists stopped for lunch at the Schuylkill Banks where Joe, joined by Ursula Reed, Chair of W3R-US and Sal Lilienthal, Bike Tour Operator and Author, gave an overview of the Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route. The final leg of the journey ended at INDE with a greeting from Superintendent Cynthia MacLeod and a tour of Independence Hall.

NHT Display in Philadelphia

The NPS and W3R®-US continue efforts to get the word out and update the Washington-Rochambeau NHT display now located in the Independence National Historical Park (INDE) Visitor Center at 6th and Market Streets in Philadelphia. We hope to temporarily refresh and enhance this display and provide additional programs and material in cooperation with INDE and our partners. This short-term fix is needed to introduce the NHT to the local community and to inform visitors, school groups, and teachers about the Washington-Rochambeau Revolutionary Route NHT. Thousands of people and school age children walk the route of the NHT in Philadelphia each day without knowing about it. And the NHT physically connects the Delaware River Waterfront, future Museum of the American Revolution, Independence Mall, Schuylkill River Trail, and points beyond with many opportunities to experience the outdoors and learn about history.

New York Outdoor Wayside Exhibits

Work on the development of outdoor wayside exhibits for fifteen sites in New York selected as destinations for the Washington-Rochambeau NHT has slowed a bit with Phil Correll's retirement. Each site will receive two exhibit panels. One will be a site-specific interpretive exhibit linking the site to part of the Washington-Rochambeau story. The second exhibit will be an overall orientation panel about the Washington-Rochambeau NHT with an inset You-Are-Here map showing the locations of the fifteen destinations in New York. We see this partnership project in New York as a prototype for wayside exhibits along the entire 700 mile Washington-Rochambeau NHT. We are working with NPS' Harper's Ferry Center to update the map on the orientation panels. As it stands at the moment, the exhibits should be delivered by the end of 2014.

D.C. Transportation Alternative Program Application

Gary Scott, D.C. Representative of the W3R-US got the ball rolling on this and suggested that we apply for a DC TAP grant to identify the D.C. resources and features associated with the route taken by the revolutionary forces on their way to Yorktown, VA. in 1780-1783. Washington, D.C. did not exist as a separate jurisdiction at the time and urban development has erased almost all traces of the rural campsites, trails, routes, landscapes and buildings that existed then. But some remain and there are opportunities to visit and experience some of these places and tell the story. In the first phase, we will obtain more details about the specific routes taken and identify specific sites and ways to tell the story at some of the many existing D.C. trails, parkways, bike trails, parks, museums, transit routes, tours, etc. Unfortunately, it was determined that this proposal was primarily research and not eligible. We hoped to complete the research and then prepare for a second phase to develop pull offs, create wayside exhibits, design and install route markers, prepare maps and publications, navigation applications, provide public access points and programs

that will allow residents and visitors to learn about and experience the NHT. Please let us know if you are aware of any sources that may be interested in funding this needed research.

Dutchess Heritage Days in Fishkill, New York

History came to life during the fifth annual Revolutionary War Weekend from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday September 20 and Sunday September 21 at the Van Wyck Homestead on Route 9 in Fishkill. Over 1000 visitors were registered and experienced what 18th-century life was like for the thousands of soldiers, families and workers who lived at the Fishkill Supply Depot and Encampment during the American Revolutionary War. The free family-friendly event was sponsored by the Fishkill Historical Society and the Friends of the Fishkill Supply Depot. The two groups conceived the event as a way to showcase local history and raise awareness about the military base, which served as a supply depot for the Continental Army and George Washington's headquarters during the Revolutionary War. It has been documented that as many as 10,000 troops lived at the encampment from 1776 through 1783. Dr. Robert Selig attended the event on behalf of the NPS, NHT and W3R-US telling the story of the American and French alliance.

L'Hermione

The arrival of the reconstructed French frigate L'Hermoine on its East Coast tour in 2015, is a great opportunity to reach people and tell them about the NHT along her journey and stops in the Northeast which include Yorktown, D.C., Annapolis, Baltimore, Philadelphia, New York, Newport RI and Boston. The ship, assigned to Lafayette, brought him from France to Boston in 1780. Lafayette then met up with General Washington and rejoined his campaign. The Hermione joined French Admiral de Grasse's fleet for the Battle off the Capes on the lower Chesapeake and the siege at Yorktown. The ship then sailed

to Philadelphia in 1781 where the Continental Congress visited and paid tribute to her. We need your ideas on how the NPS can maximize this tremendous opportunity to reach the hundreds of thousands of visitors that will see the Hermione. NPS, NHT and W3R-US will be joining the Friends of Hermione-Lafayette in America as strategic partner. This a great opportunity to showcase not only the NHT but all of our National Parks and Programs, heritage areas, trails, recreation areas, museums, state and local parks the many outstanding natural and cultural resources along the way as well as the National Park Service Centennial.

Read the Revolution

The Museum of the American Revolution issues Read the Revolution, a biweekly newsletter to inspire learning about the history of the American Revolution and its ongoing relevance. In the summer of 1781, General George Washington faced a crossroads. The Continental Army's resources were depleted; its soldiers disheartened. Two options lay before Washington: attempt to reclaim New York, or head south to defeat a British stronghold in Yorktown. Jack Kelly's book *Band of Giants* describes the circumstances surrounding Washington's important decision to march his troops to Virginia. The successful Siege of Yorktown would break Britain's will to continue the war, although it would be two more years until the final peace treaty was signed. Check out the new *The American Revolution: A Historical Guidebook.* This is an overview of historic places critical to the story of the American Revolution edited by Francis H. Kennedy, Director of The Conservation Fund's Historic Lands Program. The American Revolution: A Historical Guidebook guides general readers and students as well as travelers to 147 historic places in twenty states, presented in general chronological order. The places are drawn from the National Park Service "Report to Congress on the Historic Preservation of Revolutionary War and War of 1812 Sites in the United States". The book begins with the colonists' protests that led to the British occupation of Boston in 1768, continues through the years of the Revolutionary War, and the ratification of the Constitution. The Conservation Fund dedicates the book to all Americans and its proceeds to the protection of historic places. Jini Jones Vail will introduce Comte de Rochambeau, the general chosen by Louis XVI to bring the French army to the aid of American patriots. Rochambeau led his army through North Salem twice: heading south to join Washington's troops and camping here on the return march to the French fleet in Boston after the victory at Yorktown. Sponsored by the North Salem Historical Society, the NS Town Historian, Susan Thompson, and the Keeler Library, the program is free and open to all with no registration.
