





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THE YOSEMITE

"There can be nothing in the world more beautiful than the Yosemite, the groves of the giant sequoias... Our people should see to it that they are preserved for their children and their children's children forever, with their majestic beauty all unmarred."

– Theodore Roosevelt

On June 30, 1864 in the midst of the Civil War, President Abraham Lincoln signed an unprecedented act, the Yosemite Grant, which set aside the Mariposa Grove of Giant Sequoias and Yosemite Valley as the nation's first protected areas. The seed of an idea was planted — that our nation's most magnificent and sacred natural spaces should be preserved for everyone and for all time.


From the beginning, private support has been an essential part of the national park idea. Visionary Americans, understanding that the wonders of the American wilderness are not only our inheritance, but our responsibility, contributed their land and their philanthropy to protect these extraordinary places for future generations. Their generosity makes our experiences in Yosemite possible. Tonight we honor Abraham Lincoln, Frederick Law Olmsted, John Muir, Teddy Roosevelt, Galen Clark and the

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countless other individuals for their passion and commitment to Yosemite National Park.
