## Tire Chains May be Required, Even in Spring

Snowy weather and icy road conditions can persist into early Spring. Tire chain requirements are strictly enforced. For updated road conditions for Yosemite National Park, call 209/372-0200 (1,1). Signs will indicate when chains are required.



**R1** All vehicles without mud and snow tires are required to install chains/ cables. All vehicles must still carry chains.



R2 Chains/cables must be installed on ALL vehicles except 4-wheel/all-wheel drive vehicles with mud and snow tires.

SPEED

**R3** ALL vehicles are required to install chains/cables. NO EXCEPTIONS.

- Feeding or approaching wildlife
- Collecting plants, reptiles, or butterflies
- Hunting animals
- Picking up archeological items, such as arrowheads
- Using metal detectors

#### **Protect Wildlife—and Yourself**

#### **Speeding Kills Bears**

Being hit by a car is the most common human-related cause of death for black bears in Yosemite. Slow down! Driving too fast is almost always the reason for these accidental deaths.

#### View Wildlife from a Safe Distance

Never approach or feed any animal. Not only is it illegal, it is dangerous for both to you and the animal. Wild animals in Yosemite can transmit diseases, including plague, rabies, and hantavirus. For more information staying safe in Yosemite, visit qo.nps.gov/yosafety.



DISTANCE FROM WILDLIFE: 30 feet = about one bus-length.

## **Food Storage**

Help keep wildlife wild. Never intentionally feed any wild animal in Yosemite. Avoid unintentionally sharing your food by properly storing it. Improper food storage harms wildlife and can result in significant property damage and a hefty fine.

## **During the Day**

While hiking or picnicking, always keep your food within arm's reach. When you are away from your vehicle, keep all windows closed and any food or coolers hidden from sight. Never leave food in a pickup truck bed or strapped to the outside of a vehicle.

#### At Night

Bears can easily break into vehicles in search of food. Food, trash, and other scented items may **NOT** be stored inside vehicles overnight. These items must be kept inside a food locker, in an approved bear resistant container, or in a hotel room or cabin. Food may also be stored inside a completely hardsided RV with all windows and vents closed.

## Where is My Pet Allowed in Yosemite?



Pets are allowed in developed areas, on fully paved roads, sidewalks, and bicycle paths (except when

signed as not allowing pets), and in all campgrounds except walk-in campgrounds and group campgrounds. Pets must be restrained on a leash not more than six feet long and may not be left unattended. Other regulations also apply.

Pets are **NOT** allowed on shuttle buses or indoor lodging areas, including lobbies and rooms.



Yosemite Valley is open year-round. Known for its towering granite walls and features like El Capitan and Half Dome, the valley is alive in spring with numerous roaring waterfalls. The valley is one of the park's most accessible areas for hikers this time of year, though snow and ice may still be present on trails. Eniov a variety of other activities as well, including bicycling, exhibits, guided walks, and art and photography classes. Valley services are listed on page 4, and programs are listed on page 8.

#### **Road Conditions**

Traffic congestion is common in Yosemite Valley, especially during spring and summer and on weekends. Arrive early in the morning to find parking, then take advantage of the valley's free shuttles to spend more time enjoying the park. A map of the shuttle system can be found on pages 6 and 7.



## **Road Conditions**

The Glacier Point Road is closed in winter and early spring. The road is open only to Badger Pass when the ski area is operating.



## **Tuolumne Meadows** & Tioga Road

## **Road Conditions**

Closed for the season.

Due to its high elevation, Tioga Road is closed each year from approximately November through May. In years with very heavy snowfall, the road has re-opened as late as June. Check the park website and social media channels for updates.

Located near the park's South Entrance, the Mariposa Grove is the largest sequoia grove in Yosemite and is home to over 500 mature giant sequoias.

Park at the Mariposa Grove Welcome Plaza and hike up the road to the grove (two miles each way, with 500 feet of elevation gain.) The road and trails may be snowy and icy, even in spring. When conditions allow, a free shuttle runs from the Welcome Plaza to the grove. Check the park website for updates on shuttle service.

The Wawona Visitor Center remains closed for the season. Open yearround, the Yosemite History Center in Wawona is a collection of historic buildings associated with people and events that shaped the national park idea in Yosemite.

#### **Distance from Yosemite Valley** 30 mi/48 km (1 hour)

#### **Directions**

From Yosemite Valley, take Wawona Road (Hwy 41). Watch for signs for the Mariposa Grove just before you reach the park's South Entrance.

## Badger Pass Ski Area

Hetch Hetchy Reservoir, a source of drinking water and hydroelectric power for the City of San Francisco, is home to spectacular scenery and offers many wilderness trails. The area's low elevation makes it a good place to hike in autumn, winter, and spring, and very hot for hiking in the summer.

#### **Distance from Yosemite Valley** 40 mi/64 km (1 ½ hours)

## Directions

From Yosemite Valley, take Big Oak Flat Road (Hwy 120) to Evergreen Road, then turn right.

#### **Road Conditions**

Vehicles and/or trailers over 25 feet long and 8 feet wide are not permitted on the narrow, winding Hetch Hetchy Road. The road is open from 8am to 5pm.



## **Tuolumne Grove**

Visit sequoia groves north of Yosemite Valley that are smaller than the more-famous Mariposa Grove, but typically quieter. Park at the Tuolumne Grove parking area located on Tioga Road, and hike one steep mile down to the grove. Or, park at Merced Grove trailhead and hike two steep miles down to the grove. Remember, the walk down is easier than the walk up. Bring water. Trails may be snowy or icy even in spring

### **Distance from Yosemite Valley** 16 mi/26 km (30 minutes)

From Yosemite Valley, take Big Oak Flat Road (Hwy 120) to Tioga Road Junction at Crane Flat.

## A Ranger Recommends:

## If you're visiting Yosemite for half a day:

Take a scenic stroll around one of Yosemite Valley's meadows.

Stop at Tunnel View, El Capitan Meadow, and Valley View for scenic viewpoints.

## If you're visiting Yosemite for a full day:

Take a scenic hike to Mirror Lake or Vernal Fall

Take a Yosemite Valley Floor Tour (see page 9.)

Rent a bicycle and enjoy a scenic ride around the valley's bike paths.

Attend a guided walk or photography class. (see page 8 for a program schedule.)

## If you're visiting Yosemite for two or more days:

Visit a sequoia grove at Mariposa Grove, Tuolumne Grove, or Merced Grove. Snowshoes recommended (depending on conditions.)

Visit the Yosemite History Center in Wawona.

Visit the dam at Hetch Hetchy. Hike along the reservoir to Wapama Falls.

## **Wilderness Permits**

Wilderness permits are required year-round for all overnight trips into Yosemite's Wilderness. Visit go.nps.gov/wildpermits to learn how to get a permit this spring—or to plan for the summer ahead. Please come prepared with your own bear canister or rent one at the bookstore in the Yosemite Valley Visitor Center.

## **Yosemite Valley Wilderness Center**

Starting April 28, the wilderness center is open 8am to 5pm daily. Until the 28th, self-registration permits for valley trailheads are available in front of the visitor center. Bear canisters are available for rent at the bookstore.

## Wawona Visitor Center at Hill's Studio

Visitor Center is closed. Self-registration permits for the Wawona trailheads only are available on the front porch.

## **Badger Pass Ranger Station (A-Frame)**

Until April 2nd, self-registration wilderness permits for the Glacier Point Road trailheads only are available at the Badger Pass A-Frame, conditions permitting.

## **Big Oak Flat Information Station**

Self-registration wilderness permits for the Crane Flat area and Tioga Road trailheads only are available on the front porch.

## **Hetch Hetchy Entrance Station**

Wilderness permits for the Hetch Hetchy trailheads are available at the Entrance Station kiosk daily from 8 am to 5 pm. Permits are self-registration until April 7.

## **Half Dome Permits**

The Half Dome cables are down for the season.

Permits are required 7 days a week when the cables are up, from late May to mid-October, conditions permitting. The pre-season lottery application period for day-use permits begins March 1, 2023 and ends March 31, 2023.

## Hiking Preparedness

Early spring in Yosemite is a time of transition, with weather and trail conditions that can change quickly. Even when snow has disappeared from the valley floor, hikers climbing in elevation out of the valley are likely to encounter reminders of winter. Ask a ranger about trail conditions before you go. Trails can be icy or wet—use trekking poles, crampons, or other footwear traction devices to help prevent a serious fall. Some icy sections of trail remain closed until conditions are less hazardous. To avoid putting both yourself and rescue teams at risk, always respect trail closures. Carry a good map and compass (or GPS) and always know your location. Check the weather forecast and carry warm and waterproof layers.

## **Preventing Dehydration**

Always carry more water than you need. Prevent dehydration by sipping lots of water throughout your hike and frequently eating salty snacks.



## **Rivers and Streams**

Yosemite's water is deceptively dangerous. Visitors are strongly urged to keep a safe distance from all falling or moving water.



## Pets

Pets are permitted on fully paved roads, sidewalks, and bicycle paths only (except when signed as not allowing pets.)



The use of drones within the park boundaries is illegal under all circumstances.



## **Bicycling**

Bicycles are only allowed on paved roads and bike paths.

## **For All Seasons**

- Stay on established trails Do NOT leave the safety of the trail.
- Pack essentials including a flashlight, sunglasses, sunscreen, weather-appropriate clothing, navigation, and a signaling method (mirror and whistle).
- Always leave your travel and hiking plans, including intended route, destination, and time of return, with a trusted person.
- YOU are responsible for your safety.


