# **Parking and Driving**



The Zion Canyon Scenic Drive is closed to private vehicles while the shuttle is running. The Zion-Mt. Carmel Highway, Kolob Canyons Road, and Kolob Terrace Road are open to vehicles year-round while road conditions permit.



#### Important information for parking in Zion:

- Park in designated lots only.
- To avoid crowds, arrive before 9:00 a.m. Parking lots are usually full from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.; park in the town of Springdale and take the free shuttle into the park.
- Pull-outs along State Route 9 should not be used as shuttle access parking.
- Consider parking in Springdale to avoid delays at the entrance station. If you park in Springdale you can catch the free town shuttle to the pedestrian entrance at Zion.
- Do not park on vegetation or in roadways blocking traffic.
- $\bullet$  Do not walk on roadways, road shoulders, or social trails.
- · Pedestrians must use established walkways.

# **For Your Safety**



- Bring and drink plenty of water. Zion is a desert.
- $\bullet$  Water bottle refilling stations are shown on the map.
- Stay on designated trails. Zion's sandstone erodes easily from foot traffic. Desert soils and plants recover slowly (or not at all).
- Take responsibility for your own safety. Listen to your body and recognize its limitations. Do not take undue risks such as jumping off rocks or climbing unaided. Remember, your safety is your
- Do not feed or approach wildlife; it is dangerous and illegal.
- Human food is bad for animals, and can make them aggressive (even the squirrels and chipmunks). Wild animals can carry harmful diseases; keep a safe distance.

### Leave No Trace

- Practice "Leave No Trace" principles to protect Zion for future generations. Report graffiti and littering.
- Place trash in designated receptacles only.





- "Go Before You Go." Use the restrooms at the trailheads. You must remove your human waste from the Narrows. Disposable bags are available at local shops and the park bookstore.
- Dogs on leashes and bicycles are allowed on the Pa'rus Trail. All other trails are closed to pets and bikes.

# Trail Etiquette



- Be considerate of other visitors.
- Hike quietly and enjoy the sounds of nature.
- Hike in a single file line to let other hikers pass
- Ascending hikers have the right of way.

Canyons Trail

Limited to 12 people per group. Follows Timber and La Verkin Creeks. A side trail leads to Kolob Arch, one of the world's largest freestanding arches. Often snow covered.

Stay on established trails and watch your footing, especially at overlooks and near drop-offs Avoid cliff edges. Watch children closely. People uncertain about heights should stop if they become uncomfortable. Never throw or roll rocks because there may be hikers below.

# **Large Vehicles**



The Zion - Mt. Carmel Tunnel connects Zion Canyon to the east side of the park. It was built in the 1920s when large vehicles were less

common. Vehicles 11'4" tall or taller, or 7'10" wide or wider, require one-lane traffic control through the tunnel. Large vehicles cannot travel in a single lane through the tunnel. Nearly all RVs, buses, trailers, fifth-wheels, dual-wheel trucks, campers, and boats require traffic control.



#### **TUNNEL TRAFFIC CONTROL**

through the tunnel must pay a \$15 fee per vehicle in addition to the entrance fee. Pay this fee at the park entrance station before driving to the tunnel. The fee is valid for two trips through the tunnel for the same vehicle during a seven-day period. Rangers will stop oncoming traffic so that you may drive down the center of the road in the tunnel. We apologize for any delays associated

Vehicles 11'4" (3.4 m) tall or higher and 7'10' (2.4 m) wide or more, including mirrors, awnings, and jacks, will require traffic control in the tunnel. Single-axle vehicles may not exceed 40' in length.


#### **PROHIBITED VEHICLES**

Vehicles not permitted in the tunnel include the following: • Vehicles over 13'1" tall

- · Semi-trucks and commercial vehicles
- Vehicles carrying hazardous materials
- Vehicles weighing more than 50,000 lb
- · Combined vehicles or buses over 50 ft

Bicycles and pedestrians are also not permitted in the tunnel and must obtain a ride. Hitchhiking is permitted. Rangers are not allowed to provide or arrange for transport through the tunnel.





# Flash Floods Can Kill



- Zion experiences monsoons from mid-July into September that results in an increased risk of flash floods. Always be aware of the threat of thunderstorms and lightning and be prepared for a wide range of weather conditions.
- Temperatures in the park can vary dramatically with changes in elevation and the time of day. Day and night temperatures can differ by over 30°F/17°C. Consider dressing in layers to prepare for changes in temperature.



- If bad weather threatens, do not enter a narrow canyon. Whether hiking, climbing, or canyoneering, your safety depends on your own good judgment, adequate preparation, and instant attention to your surroundings.
- Before starting your trip, pay close attention to the weather forecast and the Flash Flood Potential Rating for the park (please see below).
