

The WACO Aircraft Company was the largest manufacturer of civil aircraft in the country in the late 1920s and early 1930s. The WACO Air Museum was established in 1997 on 100 acres and supports an authentic "Sunny" biplane available. Two hangars are dedicated to the history of the WACO Factory Aircraft Company was located in the museum's hometown of Troy, Ohio. Between 1919 and 1947, the company produced a wide range of civilian biplanes and designed the G4A glider used in WWII.

HISTORIC WACO FIELD



Experience a one-of-a-kind flight in a modern look-a-like of the world's first practical airplane. Based at Dayton-Wright Brothers Airport, the non-profit Wright "B" Flyer Inc. operates flying and non-flying airplanes built to resemble the Wright B, produced by the Wright Company in its West Dayton factory beginning in 1910. The modern regular flights at the Dayton Air Show and with appearances around the U.S. and overseas. The plane was displayed at Tempelhof Airport in Berlin, Germany in 1990 and circled the Statue of Liberty in New York in 2003.

THE WRIGHT "B" FLYER



The John W. Berry, Sr. Wright Brothers National Museum has more Wright artifacts on display than any other place in the world, including the 1905 Wright Flyer III: the only airplane designated a National Historic Landmark. The John W. Berry, Sr. Wright Brothers National Museum is a 65-acre open-air history museum. Carillon Historical Park is also the gateway to Hawthorn Hill, the Oakwood mansion that Orville Wright called home for nearly 35 years. Visitors must make arrangements in advance.

WRIGHT BROTHERS NATIONAL MUSEUM AT CARILLON PARK



Trace the footsteps and historic flights of the Wright brothers at Huffman Prairie Flying Field. Visit both the Flying Field and the Interpretive Center to learn about the Wrights' accomplishments at the field, where in 1904 and 1905, they mastered the principles of controlled, powered flight and developed the world's first practical airplane. Experience one of Ohio's largest restored prairie military installations that called the field home. **Insider Tip: Carillon Park is also the gateway to Hawthorn Hill, the Oakwood mansion that Orville Wright called home for nearly 35 years. Visitors must make arrangements in advance.*

HUFFMAN PRAIRIE FLYING FIELD & INTERPRETIVE CENTER



Dayton Aviation Heritage National Historical Park exists at the heart of one of the world's most significant, globally impactful stories: the discovery of controllable flight. This partnership-driven park has five locations to visit that focus on the lives and legacies of the Wright brothers, poet Paul Laurence Dunbar, and the community that helped them to overcome the impossible. Learn about the invention of the airplane and the Wrights' early careers as printers and bicycle builders. Explore the Wright Cycle Company on a ranger-led tour. Discover the Aviation Trail Parachute Museum, which tells the story of the free fall parachute's development at Dayton's McCook Field to modern applications on earth and beyond.

The world's largest military aviation museum features more than 360 aerospace vehicles and missiles from the beginnings of military flight to today's stealth technology. Tour 19 acres of indoor exhibit space and see a noteworthy aircraft such as the only permanent presidential aircraft—the museum offers FREE admission! Make sure you also ride a flight simulator, enjoy a 3D movie, eat in one of the two cafes, and shop in the museum store for great gifts.

Cincinnati
Cincinnati is less than an hour away from the National Aviation Heritage Area. Shine in the neon glow of the American Sign Museum and stop into Jungle Jim's International Market on your way for a truly unique culinary experience.

Columbus
Columbus, the nation's third largest fashion capital, is only an hour away from the National Aviation Heritage Area. Visits to COSI science center and the Columbus Zoo are a must for all traveling families.

Indianapolis
We don't recommend you drive quite as fast as the Indy 500 racers, but Indianapolis is just two hours away from the National Aviation Heritage Area. Visit the Indianapolis Motor Speedway for track and behind-the-scenes tours.

Detroit
MotorCities National Heritage Area in Detroit is less than three hours away from the National Aviation Heritage Area. Key stops are The Henry Ford Museum and the North American International Auto Show. Step foot in the lab where Thomas Edison had his lightbulb moment, in the Bagley Avenue shed re-created by Henry Ford to share the story of where he built his first car, and in the bicycle workshop where the Wright brothers taught us to reach for the sky.

EARLY YEARS TOUR

Grab a coffee in one of Dayton's historic districts – you're going to need it for this packed itinerary!

- Start in downtown Dayton at the Dayton Aviation Heritage National Historical Park to see how the Wright brothers got their start, learn about their cycling business, and explore their stories.
- Continue your journey to Huffman Prairie Flying Field and Interpretive Center to walk the field where the first practical airplane was invented.
- Carillon Park is your next stop to both view that first practical airplane, but also to grab lunch in the park's brewery or café.
- After you've explored all 65 acres of the museum, head to the Wright "B" Flyer and experience a flight yourself. Or, visit the Wright State University Archives to read the Wrights' diaries and letters.
- To finish out your trip, Woodland Cemetery & Arboretum provides beautiful views over Dayton's skyline from the Wright brothers' final resting place. Located near the University of Dayton and a variety of restaurants, a top pick is The Pine Club: a Dayton icon and a top ranked steakhouse throughout the nation.

**Insider Tip: this entire itinerary follows the nation's largest paved trail network and is completely bikeable. For those looking to increase their adventure, ride the rapids starting in downtown Dayton on the Great Miami River and continue paddling through West Carrollton – home of the Wright brothers' first seaplane base.*

ARMSTRONG AIR & SPACE MUSEUM

The Armstrong Air & Space Museum, named for Wapakoneta's own Neil Armstrong, exhibits a combination of aviation and aerospace collections and artifacts from the first man to walk on the moon.

The Apollo 11 crew had completed the greatest journey in human history: putting men on the moon and setting the course for the future of the nation's space program. The impact of that journey is still felt in Wapakoneta today. Businesses and streets in the community reflect the pride the city has in its native son, the first person to walk on the moon.

WRIGHT STATE UNIVERSITY WRIGHT ARCHIVES

The Wright Brothers Collection, housed in Special Collections and Archives in the Wright State University Libraries, is one of the most complete collections of Wright material in the world.

The library includes the Wrights' own technical and personal library, family papers including letters, diaries, financial records, genealogical files, and other documents detailing the lives and work of Wilbur and Orville Wright and the Wright Family. It also includes awards, certificates, medals, albums, recordings, and technical drawings. Perhaps the most valuable part of the collection are the thousands of photographs documenting the invention of the airplane and the lives of the Wright Family.

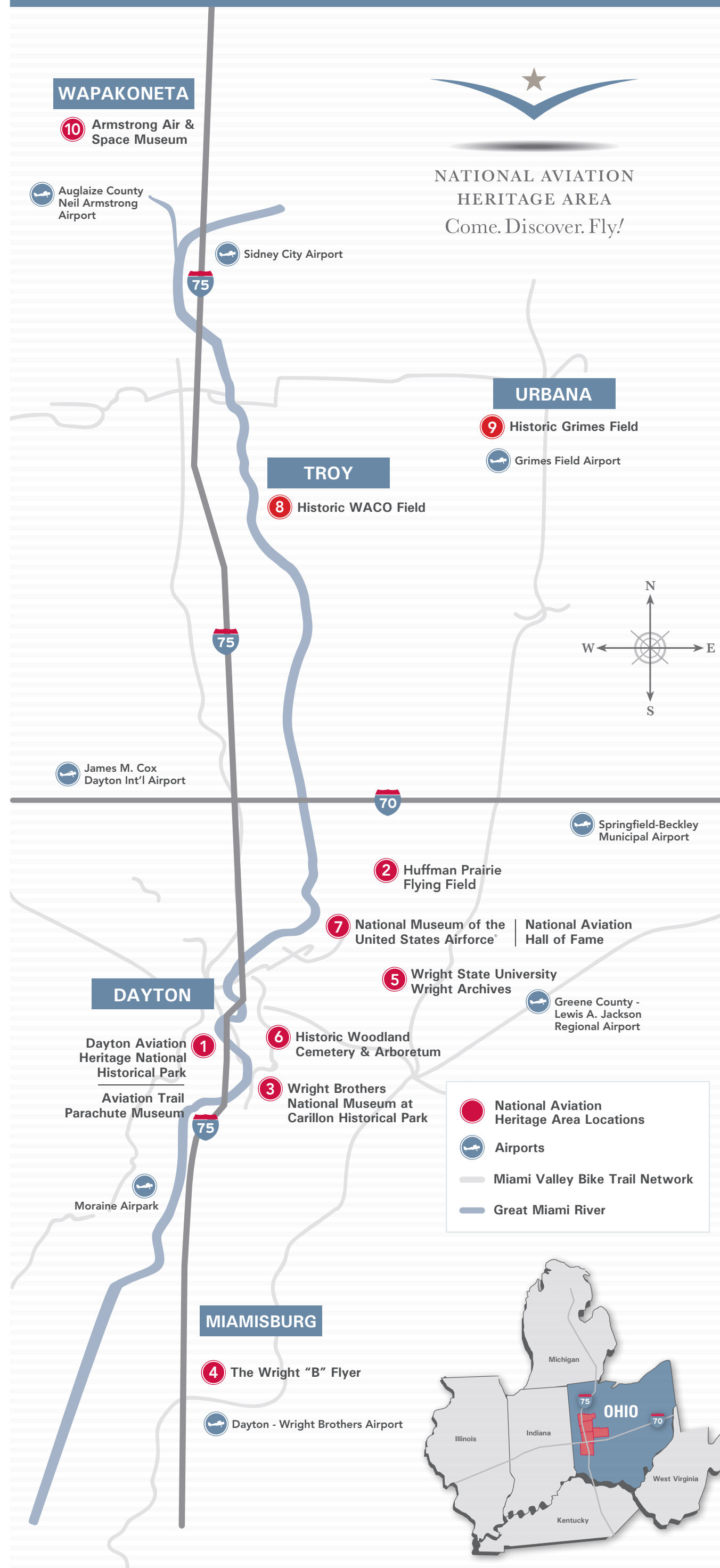

HISTORIC GRIMES FIELD

At the Champaign Aviation Museum, you'll get a close-up look at historic aircraft—particularly from World War II—that soared to great heights to preserve freedom. More than stationary museum pieces, these warbirds have been or are being restored to fly again.

And, shed new light on your appreciation for aircraft lighting and learn more about the man who was dedicated to making flight safer at night by visiting the Grimes Flying Laboratory museum. Warren G. Grimes, an enshrinee of the National Aviation Hall of Fame, produced his first airplane lights in his garage in 1933. By World War II, Grimes Manufacturing Company had grown to produce lighting for the needs of military aviation.



WOODLAND CEMETERY & ARBORETUM

Founded in 1841, Woodland Cemetery is one of the nation's oldest rural garden cemeteries and is a unique cultural, botanical, and educational resource in the heart of Dayton.

Thousands tour the beautifully landscaped grounds each year to visit the grave sites of Wilbur and Orville Wright and other members of the Wright family, poet Paul Laurence Dunbar, Governor James M. Cox, writer Erma Bombeck, inventor Charles F. Kettering and entrepreneurs John H. Patterson (NCR), George P. Huffman (Huffy Bicycles), George H. Mead (Mead Paper), Loren M. Berry, Sr. (L. M. Berry Co.), Preserved Smith (Barney & Smith Mfg. Co.), and the other 110,000 souls resting peacefully at Woodland.
