## HISTORIC PITHOLE CITY

Oil's Vanished  
Boomtown  
1865-1877

In January 1865, the wildcat Frazier Well struck oil along Pennsylvania's Pithole Creek, launching an oil frenzy.

Four months later, Colone A.P. Duncan and George C. Prather purchased land on Holmden Farm and laid



out 500 lots for lease, founding Pithole City.

By September, 15,000 people lived in Pithole and the city boasted 57 hotels, 3 theaters, an infamous "red light district," a daily newspaper, the third busiest post office in the state and more.

But, Pithole City declined almost as rapidly as it grew. The oil ran dry, major fires decimated wells and the city's hastily constructed wooden buildings and new oil discoveries in other locales pulled people away. By December 1866, Pithole's population was less than 2,000. The city charter was annulled in 1877.

Today, all that remains of Pithole City are cellar holes in the hillside meadow, but the legend lives on.

### Hours of Operation

The grounds at Historic Pithole City are open dawn to dusk year-round. The Pithole Visitor Center is open Saturdays and Sundays from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. June through August and features a scale model of the city, exhibits and an informational film. Come walk the former streets of this vanished boomtown and explore the captivating stories of its diverse population.
