THE NATIONAL MARINE SANCTUARY OF AMERICAN SAMOA





The National Marine Sanctuary of American Samoa is comprised of six sites, covering 14,376 square miles of nearshore

coral reef and offshore open ocean waters across the archipelago. Of these, three sites located on and near Tutuila are relatively accessible; Fagatele Bay and Fagalua/Fogama'a are along the southwest coast of the island, and Aunu'u is just southeast of Pago Pago Harbor. The other sites are remote and accessible only by boat; Ta'u, 93 miles northeast of Tutuila, occurs primarily along

Island, located 200 miles northwest of Tutuila, and Muliāva (Rose Atoll), located 150 miles east of Tutuila, are large areas of open ocean surrounding tiny land masses with no visitor facilities.
