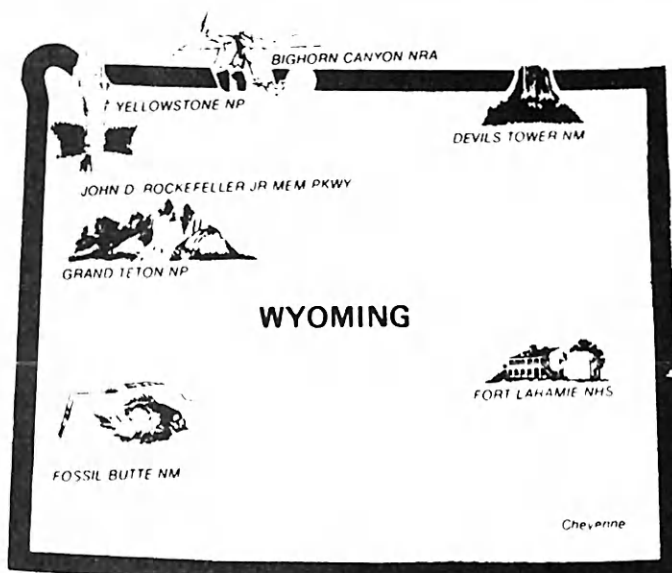

BIGHORN CANYON

OPEN YEAR ROUND No entrance fee. Camping fee is \$4/site.

Bighorn Lake, formed by Yellowtail Dam on the Bighorn River, extends 71 miles, including 47 miles through spectacular Bighorn Canyon. The Crow Indian Reservation borders a large part of the area.

DEVILS TOWER

OPEN YEAR ROUND \$3/vehicle or \$1/person entrance fee. Camping fee is \$7/site.

This 865-foot tower of columnar rock, the remains of a volcanic intrusion, is the Nations's first national monument.

FORT LARAMIE

OPEN YEAR ROUND \$1/person entrance fee. No camping facilities.

A fur-trade post once stood here, but the surviving buildings are those of a major military post that guarded covered wagon trails to the West, 1849 to 1890.

FOSSIL BUTTE

OPEN YEAR ROUND No entrance fees or camping facilities.

An abundance of rare fish fossils, approximately 50 million years old, is evidence of former habitation of this now semiarid region.

GRAND TETON

OPEN YEAR ROUND \$10/vehicle or \$4/person entrance fee. Camping fee is \$8/site; concession-operated (with hook-ups) available. Lodging rates vary.

The most impressive part of the Teton Range, this series of blue-gray peaks rising more than a mile above the sagebrush flats was once a noted landmark for Indians and "mountain men." The park includes part of Jackson Hole, winter feeding ground for the largest elk herd in America.

OPEN YEAR ROUND Entrance fee shared with Yellowstone and Grand Teton. Private lodging. Concession-operated campground with hookups.
