Kanuti National Wildlife Refuge, lying on the Arctic Circle 150 miles northwest of Fairbanks, is a patchwork of black and white spruce forest, interspersed with birch and poplars. Commercial flights are available to Bettles, two miles north of the Refuge, from Fairbanks, while charter flights are available from Bettles into the Refuge. Visitors may also boat into the Refuge on the Koyukuk River from Bettles or on one of the many streams and creeks crossing the Dalton Highway east of the Refuge. Visitors can learn more about the Refuge at the Arctic Interagency Visitor Center in Coldfoot, 265 miles north of Fairbanks along the Dalton Highway.
