



Bill Whalen, Ira Hutchison chosen to lead Park Service

Everhardt, Briggie express appreciation

Secretary of the Interior Cecil D. Andrus has appointed William J. Whalen as the new Director of the National Park Service and Ira J. Hutchison as Deputy Director.

Whalen, 36, formerly General Manager of Bay Area National Parks in San Francisco, is the tenth person to hold the top NPS position since Stephen T. Mather assumed it in 1917.

Whalen has served in San Francisco since 1972, when he was made the first Superintendent of Golden Gate National Recreation Area.

Hutchison, 50, was assigned in March to be Superintendent of Gateway National Recreation Area, N.Y.-N.J., and was before that Superintendent of National Capital Parks-East.

Whalen and Hutchison replace Gary Everhardt and William J. Briggie. Everhardt issued a memorandum, expressing appreciation to all

employees for the staunch support he and Briggie have received from Service people. (Page 3.)

Secretary Andrus praised the incoming pair, naming them "outstanding people with distinguished careers in their fields," and declaring he has "every confidence they will greatly strengthen the management of the priceless natural resources in their care."

"Bill Whalen will make a fine leader of the National Park Service," Andrus said. "He is already an experienced career man at a relatively young age. He has demonstrated independence, imagination, and unusual ability to work with people in all kinds of situations. We expect him to put some innovative ideas to work."

Assistant Secretary Robert L. Herbst said the new appointee had demonstrated "unusually strong ability as manager, and, just as importantly, a genuine talent for working with the public under frequently heavy pressures."

A native of Burgettstown, Pa., (a suburb of Pittsburgh) Whalen holds a Bachelor's degree in Social Studies from Clarion State College in

Pennsylvania, and did graduate work in psychology and counseling at Indiana State College, Indiana, Pa.

He joined the Park Service in April 1965 as a counselor at the Tremont Job Corps Center in Great Smoky Mountains National Park, N.C.-Tenn; and then held a similar position at Catocin Mountain Park in Maryland.

In May 1969 he was assigned to Washington, D.C., as a training and development specialist. In 1970, he was made chief of Urban and Environmental Activities for National Capital Parks, developing special training to familiarize new rangers with the attitudes and needs of visitors from urban areas, and managing the Summer-in-the-Parks program.

In July 1971, Whalen was sent to Yosemite

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National Park as a "trouble-shooter" and remained there as Deputy Superintendent in charge of day-to-day operations.

In January 1972, he was sent to San Francisco with the assignment of turning the newly-authorized Golden Gate National Recreation Area into an operating park. During this tenure, he made arrangements for the donation for GGNRA of lands owned by the Army, the State of California and the City of San Francisco. More than 150 workshops were conducted in the course of the planning and decisionmaking process for the recreation area.

Whalen's responsibility was expanded in July 1974 to include management of Point Reyes National Seashore, Muir Woods National Monument and Fort Point National Historic Site as well as GGNRA.

He has won a number of major awards, including the Arthur S. Flemming Award (1970), which honors the 10 outstanding young men in U.S. Government, the Meritorious Service Award of the Department of the Interior, and the "I Left My Heart In San Francisco Award" for the successful beginnings of GGNRA.

Whalen is married to the former Mary Chastulik of Burgettstown, Pa., and they have four sons, Bill, 17, Dennis, 15, Tim, 13, and Mike, 11.

Ira Hutchison, a native Kansan, born and raised in Topeka, Kansas, earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Physical Education and Recreation from Kansas State University, and a Master of Science degree in recreation from Teachers College, Columbia University, and has completed course-work leading to a Doctorate degree.

Prior to joining the Service he held several positions with the National Recreation and Park Association over a 7-year period, including Director of Urban Affairs; Executive Secretary, National Therapeutic Recreation Society; Assistant to the President for Urban Affairs; and Assistant to the President for Policy Formulation and Legislative Liaison.

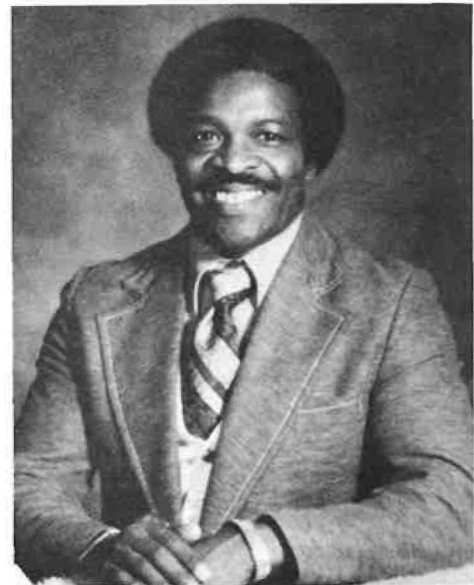
Hutchison joined NPS in 1972, as chief of community programs and chief of Urban Environmental Activities for National Capital Parks. In 1974 he was appointed Superintendent of National Capital Parks-East, and managed such areas as Fort Washington, Md., the Frederick Douglass Home, and Anacostia and Fort Dupont Parks, Oxon Hill Farm and the Suitland Parkway.

He is a contributing author of two books "Recreation and Special Populations," and "Recreation and Leisure Service for Disadvantaged." He is the recipient of several awards, including the Distinguished Service Award of the National Therapeutic Recreation Society, a branch of the NRPA.

Hutchison and his wife Patricia have three daughters, Kandl, 12, Kerri, 10, and Angela, 8, and reside in Silver Spring, Md.

Stanton named MAR Director



Richard L. Stanton, 53, has been named director of the Mid-Atlantic Region. He assumed his new post in early June.

Stanton succeeds Chester L. Brooks, who was named superintendent of Rocky Mountain National Park, Colo.

A Washington, D.C., native, he comes to this position from the National Capital Region where he served as associate regional director since 1970.

The veteran of 25-plus years of Federal service joined NPS in 1965. He has served as chief of land acquisition for the former Eastern Service Center—directing the acquisition programs for Cape Cod National Seashore, Mass., and Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore, Mich., among others.

He has also served as chief of Concessions Management, WASO.

During his NCR tenure, he served as NPS' principal alternate for the NCR director on the D.C. Zoning Commission and represented the Interior Secretary on the National Capital Planning Commission. He was also chairman of the Appalachian National Scenic Trail Advisory Commission.

He attended George Washington and American Universities in Washington, D.C. He will reside in Cherry Hill, N.J., with his wife, Sarah and 10-year-old daughter, Sarah Lee.

Former Director Everhardt said of his appointment: "Stanton brings to this job a rich background of experience and professionalism."

YCC at Blue Ridge

This summer, along the Blue Ridge Parkway, N.C.-Va.-Ga., 118 youngsters aged 15 through 18, are sprucing up trails, clearing vistas and making campground repairs as part of the Parkway's expanded Youth Conservation Corps Program.

The camps, mostly for high school students, are located at or near Oteen and Boone, N.C., and Ferrum and Buena Vista, Va. Camps are operating from June 20 until August 8.

Only the Oteen Camp, which is the only one operated by the Park Service, is a day camp. The other three are residential.

Appalachian State University of Boone, N.C., operates the Cone-Price Camp; Ferrum College of Ferrum, Va., runs the Rocky Knob

Camp and Southern Seminary College of Buena Vista, Va., operates the James River Camp.

YCC members are engaged in projects designed to teach the youngsters' associations between the work they do and the environment in which they live. Included in their 40-hour work week is 8 hours of environmental education.

On the parkway, the YCC members are involved with trail maintenance, vista clearing, campground repairs and similar work, for which they are paid.

The program, initiated several years ago, has proven so popular that the names of enrollees are drawn by lot. The parkway had

three camps in 1976 and hopes not only to expand the present four camps, but add to the number in 1978, according to Superintendent Joe Brown.

Historic site authorized for great First Lady

Congress passed legislation May 27 authorizing the estate of Eleanor Roosevelt, Val-Kill, adjacent to Hyde Park, to become a national historic site in honor of the great First Lady.

Mrs. Roosevelt used her Val-Kill estate as a personal retreat from her busy life. The pastoral setting of the cottage, built for her by her husband, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, in 1924, includes fields, trees, swamps, and ponds.

She also used the estate to entertain friends and dignitaries and to promote the many humanitarian causes she was interested in.

During the long presidency of FDR, Eleanor Roosevelt demonstrated a deep social conscience, and a deep compassion for human suffering, steered no doubt by her husband's long illness and handicap.

Val-Kill was a place where she sought solitude and refreshment of spirit. On a picnic in the late summer of 1924, Eleanor and her friends, Marion Dickerman and Nancy Cook, lamented that they would not be able to return to the Val-Kill area until the following summer. FDR resolved then to build a cottage for his wife on the very spot of that long ago picnic so that it could be enjoyed year round.

The original idea for use of the area was for refreshment of the spirit, but later an idea was conceived to use the area for Val-Kill Industries, to provide extra income and training for people in the rural areas of Upstate New York by employing them in the reproduction of early American furniture. Later the project expanded to include other crafts such as weaving, but the Val-Kill Industries was short-lived.

The cottage built by FDR continued to be used by Nancy Cook and Miss Dickerman, while the factory was remodeled to accommodate an apartment for Mrs. Roosevelt and the overflow from the "Big House," i.e., Hyde Park—known today as FDR National Historical Site.

Eleanor spent her summers here and even came on winter weekends. And here, she entertained friends, which included royalty, prime ministers, and presidents.

After the death of her husband in 1945, Eleanor was 61, and she began a new life which she referred to as "On My Own." She served her country in the United Nations; was elected to the Commission on Human Rights of UNESCO, and participated in drafting the Declaration of Human Rights and the Covenants, exhibiting the emerging role of women in the post-war world. When the Republicans came to power in 1953, Eleanor still played a very powerful role of influencing national politics. It was to Val-Kill that she retreated from this whirlwind life.

The authorizing legislation for Val-Kill includes acquisition of the 174.86 acres by donation, purchase with donated or appropriated funds or exchange of lands.

The site, which is not now open to the public will commemorate, for the education, inspiration, and benefit of present and future generations, the life and work of Eleanor Roosevelt; provide a site for the continuing study of the issues to which she devoted her intellect and conserve for public use an area of natural open space in our expanding urban world.



Herbert Hoover was born in a simple two-room cottage Aug. 10, 1874, in the tiny village of West Branch, nestled among the gently rolling fertile farmlands of Iowa. The early Quaker heritage of the community is reflected in the well-kept spacious lawns, white picket fences, and American Gothic-style homes.

This neighborhood presents a show-case of middle America, much as in times past.

The Herbert Hoover National Historic Site—birthplace of the 31st President of the United States, boyhood home and neighborhood where he grew to manhood—was authorized in 1965.



“My roots are in this soil”

Today is a brisk, sunny day in mid-February. The snow has almost all melted, leaving the sod somewhat spongy. And so as we tour the grounds we stick to the boardwalks, typical of the period. Superintendent Grant Petersen, who is our guide, tells us that some of these wooden walks were reconstructed by the YCC last summer, and more

will be added in the future.

As we stroll along these walks that border Downey Trace, we notice the inviting porches of these period homes. The picket fences that frame each yard are not only decorative, but in the 1880's served to protect the flowers and lawns from the cattle as they were driven down the streets of the town to the railroad depot. The homes are painted to resemble their original colors—pastel pink, green, grey and gold, with contrasting trim on the gingerbread. None are presently open to

the public. Some serve as quarters for the park staff. Superintendent Petersen and his family live in the Hayhurst house. Their neighbors, Chief Ranger Tom Henry's family, live in the Dr. James Staples home. Across the street is the David Mackey home, occupied by Park Technician Rick DuBall and his wife Ruth. Park Historian Betsy Duncan-Clark and her mother share the Dr. Leech home. Maintenance foreman Al Huschka and his family live in the Isaac Miles farm home. Park residents

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are provided with cable television so that there won't be any distracting TV antennas sprouting from the roof-tops of these old homes.

On Penn Street is a reconstruction of a blacksmith shop similar to the one the President's father, Jesse Hoover, operated here in the 1870's. In front of the shop is a spring-wagon built by Merle Holland, the blacksmith of today. Merle and his assistant Denzil Lawson work in the shop daily during the spring and summer, demonstrating the blacksmith craft by making horseshoes, boot-scrappers, trivets and boot-jacks. The blacksmiths are quite an attraction with the thousands of schoolchildren who tour the site each spring and fall.

Across Penn Street is the Hoover cottage, where the 31st President was born more than a hundred years ago. Clam shells border the flower gardens at the front door. In the back yard are a vegetable garden, pump and privy. A proud Rhode Island Red rooster struts in the chicken yard with his flock of 12 plump hens. On the little back porch is a good supply of neatly stacked fire-wood, and a child's wooden coaster wagon. A small room off the porch served as a summer kitchen and is outfitted with all the latest conveniences: cherry pitter, apple peeler, kraut cutter, candle molds, cast-iron kettles, coffee grinder, and an assortment of crockery bowls and jars.

Inside the cottage the black iron stove conjures up nostalgic smells of burning wood and home-baked bread. During the winter this stove also heated the home. In the warmer weather it was moved out to the summer kitchen.

Helen Fawcett, dressed in an appropriate dark colored Quaker dress and bonnet, works as a seasonal interpreter here. She chats with visitors about Mr. Hoover's childhood and points out the cradle and high chair that were used by the Hoover children. The daybed is covered with a patchwork quilt of woolen suit samples; and the Seth Thomas clock dated 1879

ticks away on the clock shelf. A few books share the clock shelf, including a Bible, Fox's Journal, and the Discipline of the Quaker Meeting. A soap stone rests under the stove. (These were heated and then wrapped and taken to Meeting and placed on the floor to keep one's feet warm.)

A tiny bedroom contains a bureau, washstand and sewing machine. A low trundle bed extends out from under the larger rope bed with the lindsey-woolsey coverlet and crisp white pillow cases.

We leave the warmth of the uncluttered simple cottage and continuing on the boardwalk we cross Wapsinonoc Creek. This stream near the cottage provided hour upon hour of entertainment for the neighborhood children. At one point near the railroad bridge 2 blocks east of the cottage, the stream was dammed to form a swimming hole. Mr. Hoover recalled fishing as a boy:

"There were sunfish and catfish to be had. Nor did we possess the modern equipment in artificial lures...we were still in that rude but highly effective epoch of the willow poles with a butcher-string line and hooks ten for a dime. And the dime was hard to come by. Our compelling lure was a segment of an angleworm and our incantation was to spit on the bait. We lived in the time when a fish used to bite instead of strike and we knew it bit when the cork bobbed, and moreover we ate the fish."

Situated a little farther on, along the banks of the Wapsinonoc is the simple, unadorned Meetinghouse built by the Society of Friends of West Branch in 1856. It was here that the Quaker community would gather for silent worship. Each person would meditate quietly, but anyone who felt moved by the spirit could stand up and share a prayer or a poem, or testify to the rest of the meeting. The Meetinghouse is divided in the center by a partition and a door. The purpose of this partition was to separate men and women, an indication

that they had an equal voice in the Meeting. Hulda Hoover, the President's mother, was a recorded minister of this Meeting and therefore sat in the "facing benches" at the Meetinghouse, which were reserved for ministers and elders.

Before we leave the Meetinghouse we take a glimpse at the "cry room." This room with its cribs and rocking chairs provided a place for children who caused a disturbance in the silent meeting.

Superintendent Petersen took us on to the Hoover Presidential Library, where we spent an exciting hour. Of course, an hour is all too short a time to view all of the fascinating exhibits, but arrangements had been made for Chief Ranger Tom Henry to meet us in his patrol car for a ride to the grave site. Although it would have been a pleasant walk across the meadow in summer, we were grateful for the protection of the car against the brisk wind that whipped across the prairie. As we wound our way up to the knoll where President and Mrs. Hoover are buried we observed the dun-colored prairie grass on the surrounding hills. In the springtime we are told these grasses turn a beautiful light green, and wild flowers and birds abound.

Back at the visitor center we took one more look at the extraordinarily fine exhibits, and learned that they had been designed and built by the park staff. As we said our good-byes to park friends, we received a packet of literature. The prize item in the various publications was a small paper-bound book in color that had been researched and written by Park Interpreter Pat Wheeler and published by Eastern National Park & Monument Association. Entitled, "My Roots Are In This Soil," the closing paragraph summarizes Mr. Hoover's thoughts about West Branch in this way:

"My grandparents and my parents came here in a covered wagon. In this community they toiled and worshipped God. They lie buried on your hillside. The most formative years of my boyhood were spent here. My roots are in this soil. This cottage where I was born is physical proof of the unbounded opportunity of American life."

Clara Barton: dispelling the legends difficult

The Clara Barton National Historic Site, located in Glen Echo, Maryland, is a newcomer to the NPS. The Friends of Clara Barton donated the house to the people of the United States on April 29, 1975.

Learning about a woman as famous as Clara Barton, in order to interpret her to visitors, has been an interesting process. It is surprising that a woman as well-known as Clara Barton is so little understood. There have been a few biographies of Clara Barton, but there has never been one which based its concepts on a complete review of information available at the Library of Congress. Boxes filled with correspondence, newspaper clippings and Miss Barton's diaries are there. Her biographers have rarely portrayed Clara Barton as a true-to-life human being—a woman who, despite her great achievements, had faults just like the rest of us.

Researchers have been delving deeper into Miss Barton's personality, her Red Cross activities and her Glen Echo home. Elizabeth Pryor, a historian under contract with the Park Service, has recently finished a manuscript on Clara Barton. Two years of reading at the Library of Congress have allowed Ms. Pryor to dispel a few of the legends surrounding Miss Barton. For instance, she found that her passport gave her height as 5 feet, 5 inches—significantly taller than the 4 feet, 8 inches previously thought to be fact. It was discovered that Miss Barton tended to be a rather unhand-some dresser. A description of a dress of hers describes it as a tacky patchwork of material in various shades of green, with a piece of ragged beaver fur sewn around the hem!

Pryor has also finished a grounds report on the house which proves that the site appears quite different today than it did at the turn-of-the-century. The large parking lot connecting the historic site to Glen Echo Park was then a pasture where the household's horses and cows grazed. Numerous fruit trees and a vegetable garden once grew next to the house, supplying a large amount of produce which Miss Barton cooked and canned.

The draft of a Historic Structures Report, executed by NPS researcher Charles Snell, has similarly overturned romantic misconceptions. For example, it is widely believed that the lumber was shipped down the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal, and that Clara Barton then designed a house to look like a steamboat called the "Mississippi." Not so, according to the latest findings. All the lumber from an 1889 hotel, built in Johnstown, Pa., by the Red Cross to house flood victims, was brought south on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad. Clara Barton's Glen Echo home was built in 1891 with this lumber which belonged to the American Red Cross. The utilitarian home/Red Cross headquarters was not intended to resemble a Mississippi riverboat, according to Paul Goeldner, historical architect, Professional Services, NCR.

The most striking feature of the house might be the oval "well" or "gallery" which

is rimmed by a balustrade and which gives the first-floor visitor a view of the second and third floors and an "uppermost" room constructed above the third floor. The main stairway is of a design typical to the period. The Red Cross windows in a second-floor room at the front of the house are original. Although they are not lit up, they are quite striking when seen either from the front lawn or from inside the house.

Although the structure was built in 1891, Clara Barton and her Red Cross workers did not move in until 1897 when a trolley line was completed to Glen Echo. She then had a means of commuting between her Red Cross headquarters/home and her important contacts in Washington, D.C. Photographs of the interior of the house during the historic period, 1897-1912, have been found. These photographs were used in a recent effort to arrange the furniture in the home

as nearly as possible as it was during the time Miss Barton lived there. Also on display are a few of her personal possessions. The Park Service staff hopes that, as people learn more of the historic site, additional articles owned and used by Clara Barton will be discovered and returned to the house.

Many questions about Miss Barton's personality and her organization still remain. It is hoped that continuing research will provide accurate answers to these many questions.

(Editor's Note: Although the February issue of the NPS Newsletter carried an article on the Clara Barton House, knowledge of further research has come to our attention, and we believe our readers will be pleased with the writer's effort to separate fact from legend, as well as to give us some additional information not previously published.)

Shenandoah concessions: great changes over 42 years

"See those beams up there — all chestnut lumber," smiled Grant Bannen, vice-president for parks of the subsidiary of ARA Services, Inc., that operates the food service, lodging and visitor amenities for Shenandoah National Park, Va.

"You won't find wood like that used in construction any more," he said proudly as we walked across the pegged floors of Big Meadows Lodge. "The blight killed most of the chestnuts and still prevents their growth."

Like building-construction materials, the concessions picture at Shenandoah has also changed greatly in the park's 42-year history.

From a Mom-and-Pop operation founded by the late Samuel Bemiss, the concession

has grown to a people-serving business that now includes two large lodges (Big Meadows and Skyland), 14 rustic cabins, four camp stores with souvenir sales and short-order food service, four service stations along the Skyline Drive, two stables, two craft stores, a bicycle rental service, firewood and ice supplies, and coin-operated showers. ARA employs some 300 people at the height of the season.

In 1972, Fitzgerald Bemiss, son of the original owner, merged his company with ARA Services Inc., in exchange for stock in ARA. Today, Bemiss continues as president of ARA Virginia Sky-Line Company, a wholly owned subsidiary of ARA. Frank Brown, former vice-president of the Bemiss-owned company, continues as senior vice-president of ARA Virginia Sky-Line.

"We feel that ARA Services brings to a park concession a strong financial position and the varied expertise of a large company," says Bannen.

In addition to the concession at Shenandoah, ARA Services also operates the concession at Mesa Verde National Park, Colo., and at five Alabama State parks where the company runs resort hotels.

"But we don't try to make the decisions at Shenandoah from our corporate board room in Philadelphia," Bannen says. "Within our contract with the Park Service and our own guidelines, I run the concession here much as I would run a company of my own."

"In my experience here, no major decision I have made in the field has been reversed by an officer or the board of the company."

For example, he said, when retail food

prices jumped nationwide by 20 percent in 1975, Virginia Sky-Line raised its food prices at the lodges by only 8 percent and thereby kept its customers.

"We have a good working relationship with Superintendent Jacobsen and his staff," Bannen says. "Under our contract, park personnel come in and evaluate all phases of our operation three times a year. In addition, we receive a monthly sanitation inspection and a yearly health inspection by the U. S. Public Health Service."

"Any points of difference are discussed and solved at the local level. To my knowledge we have had no problem that had to be referred to Philadelphia — either to the Mid-Atlantic regional office or to ARA headquarters."

Bannen points out that serving the public in a park has some important differences from running a restaurant on Main Street. "We work under some definite limitations," he says, "but we understand their purpose."

"For example, since no large trucks are allowed to use the Skyline Drive, we bring our supplies to a large warehouse in Luray. Then we transport them from the warehouse to our lodges and camp stores by small truck or van. The largest fuel truck we send to resupply the service stations holds only 2,300 gallons."

"That may not be the most economical way to run a business, but it's the best way to preserve the character of the park and keep the Skyline Drive from looking like a superhighway."

Grant Bannen got into the food-serving business while still a student at Michigan State University. "I had to work my way through," he remembers, "so I took every job I could find — busboy, waiter and bartender."

Following college, he decided to put this practical experience to use so he went to work for the Playboy Clubs in Chicago, later progressing to manager of the club in Cincinnati.

Leaving the Playboy organization, he joined the Hyatt Hotel chain. Later, he accepted a position as regional manager with ARA Services. He lives with his wife, Diane, and children Grant, 7, and Michael, 3, in Atlanta, Ga.

An eager backpacker, he hits the trail himself on days off in Shenandoah. "I like to get out there in the fall or winter when you have the woods to yourself," he says.

The Director of Operations of the concession at Shenandoah is Richard Good who had worked with the former concessioner as well. His main concern is the day-to-day operation of the concession. "I go around to each of the big units every day," he says. "There is no substitute for checking on things first hand."

On days off, he can be found wetting a line in a trout stream or "fooling around" with two vintage convertibles he keeps in tip top condition. He and his wife Anna Belle are the parents of three daughters and one son and recently became grandparents for the first time.

MARO research symposium at Shenandoah

More than 25 research experts, many of them active in field investigations for the National Park Service, shared their findings at a 2-day symposium at Luray, Va., April 21-22.

The second annual Shenandoah Research Symposium was broadened in scope this year to include reports of projects being undertaken throughout the Mid-Atlantic region.

Reports by biologists, archeologists, engineers, architects and historians reflected the variety of research projects currently underway.

W. Dean Cocking, assistant professor of biology at Madison College in Harrisonburg, Va., concluded from his 3-year sequence of experiments with sample burnings that no adverse effects would occur to wildlife and plant life from burning vegetation in the Big Meadows area of Shenandoah National Park. After hearing the report, Superintendent Robert R. Jacobsen announced that the park would adopt limited burning of the meadow area as a management tool. He expects to save several hundred dollars a year over the cost of mowing the meadow.

Archeologist Fred W. Kinsey, director of the North Museum at Franklin and Marshall College in Lancaster, Pa., reported on several seasons of digs within Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area, Pa. — N.J. He described artifacts the team has discovered that give evidence of early Indian groups who fished and hunted along the river.

Nicholas Gianopoulos, structural engineer with the firm of Keast and Hood, Inc., of Philadelphia, reported on an engineering solution he prescribes for Hampton National His-

EEO: easy to say, harder to do

Interior Secretary Cecil D. Andrus outlined his objectives on equal opportunity employment May 17 at the Departmental auditorium before a large group of Washington, D.C., employees, men and women, black and white.

After welcoming remarks by Peggy Coates, EEO assistant for the Bureau of Mines, and a statement of purpose by Carmen Santana, acting EEO officer for the Secretary's Office, Secretary Andrus was introduced by John Fulbright, assistant director of EEO for the Department.

Secretary Andrus said one of his top EEO

priorities is to see that all employees be "treated fairly, with dignity and respect."

He said he wanted to make sure that equal employment opportunity becomes a reality to all employees, but that it was easy to say, harder to do.

"With the cooperation of all of you, we'll have the best affirmative action program in Government," Secretary Andrus said.

He outlined a plan of action which included developing a program to achieve specific EEO objectives in a two-pronged attack. First, he said, "we" must take the leadership in assuring an expanded EEO program within the Department of the Interior, and, second, "we" must develop an "outreach" program to aid those seeking employment with the Interior Department. This included active recruitment on college campuses with large populations of female and minority students.

Other primary objectives in his program included seeking ways to achieve prompt action on discrimination complaints; the setting of goals and evaluation of progress, and attempting to achieve a greater utilization of women and minorities in mid- and high-level positions, through use of the upward mobility program.

Andrus also emphasized that a greater push should be exerted in utilizing the services of female and minority-owned businesses as Interior Department contractors.

Then, Secretary Andrus introduced Nan

Brown, "our sparkplug," new appointee as Departmental Director of the Federal Women's Program. She spoke on the subject of "The Federal Women's Program and You."

Her rousing speech was enthusiastically received. She reviewed the FWP from its inception in the '60s to the present, pointing out its inadequacies as well as some of its positive impacts on women. She pointed out that there are now more women in the workforce at Interior and more in upper levels since the inception of the program. She also stated that because of the Federal Women's Program, more women are becoming aware of their rights, more are setting career goals and more have a greater interest in improvement through education.

She thanked the Secretary for his appointment of several women to high level positions in the Department, including Hether Ross, Ruth Van Cleave, Barbara Hiller, Cynthia Wilson, and Joan Davenport.

But then she made her pitch for minority women — pointing out that there were only three minority women in the Department at grade GS-15 or above, all in the Bureau of Indian Affairs. "We can do better," she said.

After her remarks, Ms. Brown introduced the FWP coordinators for the various Interior bureaus, including NPS's Jeanetta Foreman.

At the end of the program, a film, "We are Women," narrated by Helen Reddy, was shown.

Other talented members of the Harpers Ferry Center also include Lee Allen, Brian Jones, Rick Krepela, and Tom Gray.

Magaziner named AIA Fellow

Henry J. Magaziner, historical architect for the Mid-Atlantic Region of the Park Service, was named a Fellow of the American Institute of Architects (AIA), and admitted to its College of Fellows.

This honor was conferred for his "notable contributions to the advancement of the profession of architecture."

Since 1972, Magaziner has been the major architect for the 19 parks which comprise the five-state Mid-Atlantic Region. He is involved with preservation of numerous historical structures.

One of the projects to which Magaziner points with pride, and which is an outstanding example of cooperation between the National Park Service and the community, is his development of a historically oriented central business district renewal plan for Gettysburg, Pa., adjacent to Gettysburg National Military Park. He serves as consultant on the plan which is now being implemented.

The plan involves diverting traffic from the center of town and restoring historic buildings surrounding Gettysburg's central district.

Magaziner studied aerial maps, then walked the area to make certain that open areas indicated on maps were there in reality. To control traffic flow, he designed a "necklace" of parking lots held together by a loop driveway, in these open areas surrounding central Gettysburg.

Buildings will be restored to their appearance during the time of the Civil War, with enameled steel sheathing removed to expose original building materials.

Before he joined the Government in 1972, Magaziner was in private practice for many years, working with institutional, residential, historical preservation and city planning projects.

Coleman new super at Olympic

In May, James W. Coleman assumed his new position as superintendent of Olympic National Park, Wash., in the Pacific Northwest Region. Formerly superintendent of the Albright Training Center at Grand Canyon National Park, he succeeds Roger W. Allin, who recently retired.

Jim began his Park Service career in 1958 at National Capital Parks in Washington, D.C., and later served in several parks before being named superintendent of the Mound City, Ohio, NPS Group. He was superintendent of Saratoga National Historical Park, N.Y., and then served 2 years in Washington, D.C., as coordinator of special task forces for the Park Service.

In 1971, Coleman was named assistant superintendent at Yellowstone National Park,



Wyo.-Mont., and was superintendent of the Morristown National Historical Park and Edison National Historic Site in New Jersey before going to Albright.

Coleman, a native of Petersburg, Va., grew up in Gettysburg, Pa., where his father was superintendent of Gettysburg National Military Park. He graduated from Pennsylvania State University in 1958 with a degree in history.

Coleman is married to the former Patricia Sarsfield of Washington, D.C. They have three children, Teresa Ann, 11; James Jr., 10, and Kenneth Patrick, 7.

To the Editor:

I have just read an article by Paul Hodge in the *Washington Post* about a problem that made me stop and think, and I wonder: How many predictions have we heard or read about concerning the future impact on the American way-of-life because of our need to conserve energy?

How much effort has been directed to making predictions about the impact of energy conservation on various industries?

The flow of water in the Colorado River is expected to be so low at night and during weekends that it will be almost impassable for large rubber rafts. And, periods of low water-flow will be the result of withholding water by up-river dams because of less demand for electricity during these periods.

My thought is: If enough people will stay home and work at night and on weekends, there could possibly be enough electricity used to force the power companies to release more water, and people who would like to spend a weekend on a float trip could do so—and everyone would be happy—especially those who earn overtime pay for working nights and Sundays, for they could afford to pay the increased cost of electricity.

All this proves is that the energy problem is very, very complex.

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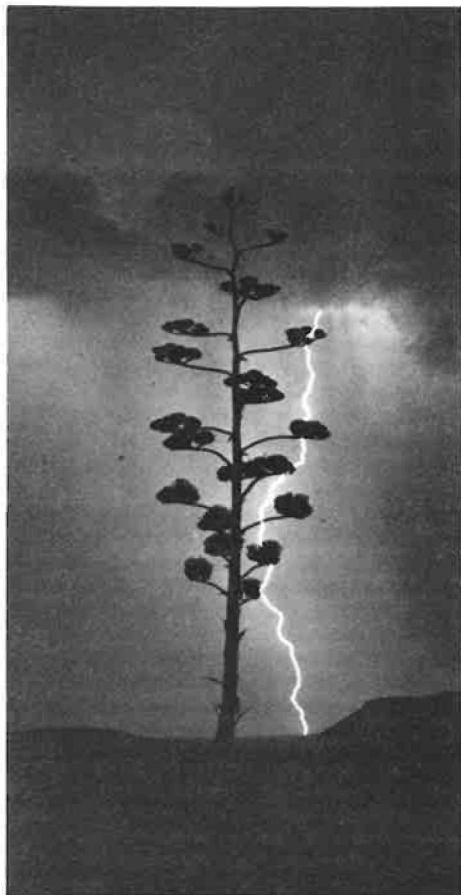
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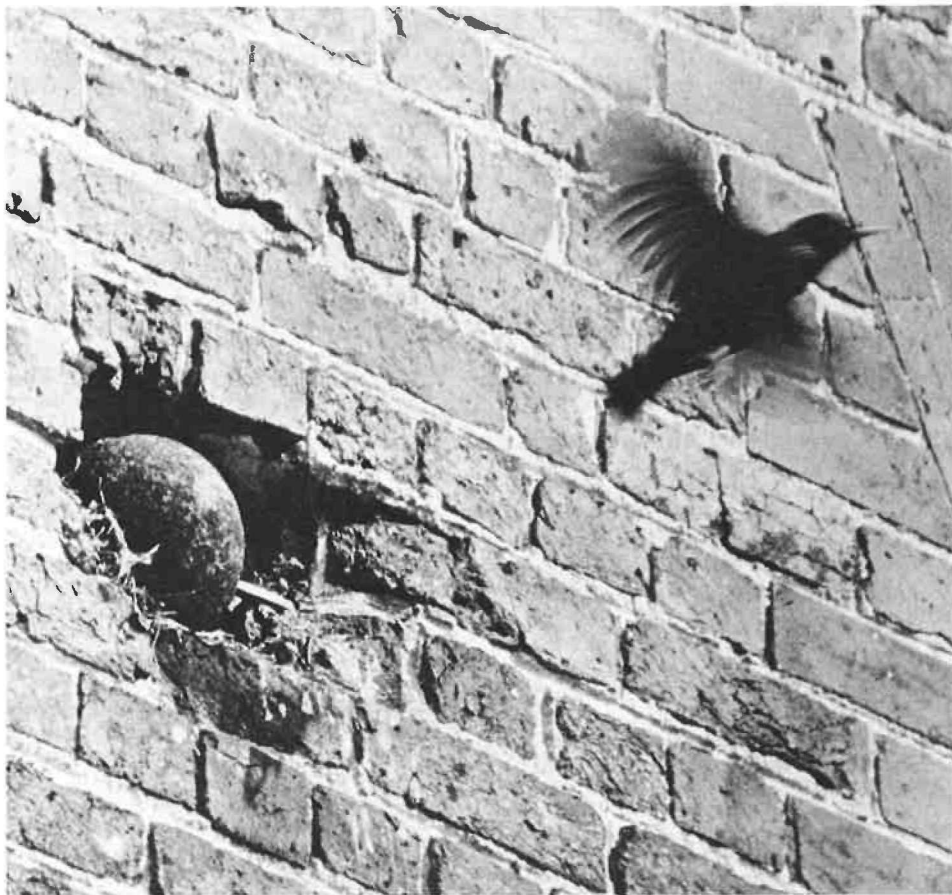

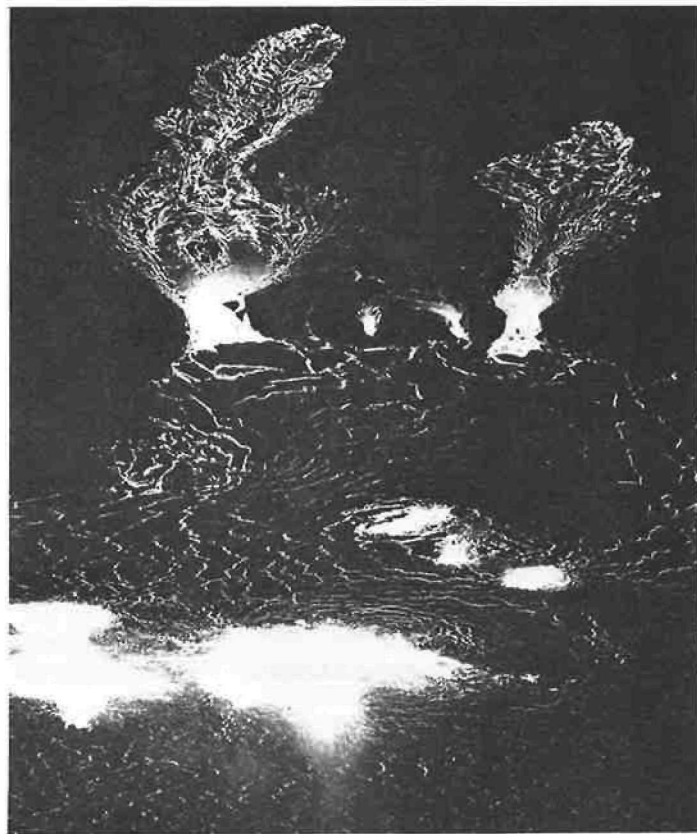
