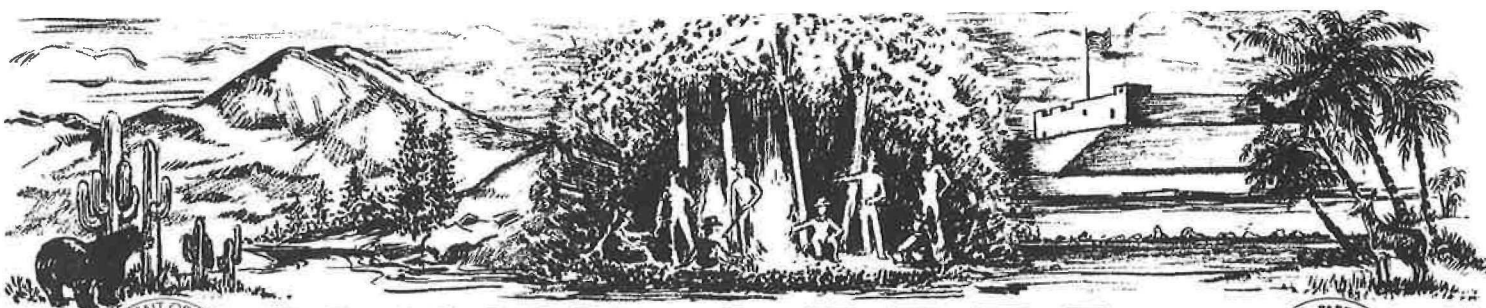

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INTRODUCING - - -

The Secretary's Advisory Board On National Parks, Historic Sites, Buildings and Monuments.

Today, it is standard operating procedure for the Secretary of the Interior and the Director of the National Park Service to ask, routinely: "What does the Advisory Board recommend?" And now—more and more frequently—we find that the Bureau of the Budget and the Congress are also requesting the views of the Advisory Board before taking action on certain vital legislative proposals.

Just who are these dedicated men and women who play such a vital role in the affairs of the National Park Service? In essence, they are private citizens who are nationally recognized leaders in their own professions, and who are also highly competent in one or more of the fields of history, archeology, architecture, or human geography. They have been selected personally by the Secretary of the Interior and have accepted his invitation to serve on the Advisory Board for 6-year terms, without remuneration. As the name of the Board implies, their role is strictly advisory on matters relating to the programs and policies of the National Park Service and the administration of programs under the Historic Sites Act.

The Secretary's Advisory Board presently meets three times a year. One of these meetings is usually devoted to on-site inspection of existing areas of the National Park System, or of areas proposed for addition to the System. The 1967 field trip, for example, found the Advisory Board inspecting the colorful Canyonlands and Glen Canyon areas. On their 1968 field trip, the Board gathered background information that will be essential to future deliberations on the development and management of the newly authorized Redwood National Park, North Cascades National Park, Ross Lake National Recreation Area, and Lake Chelan National Recreation Area.

At its 59th meeting, October 7-10, in addition to taking up various matters concerning the management and development of key areas of the National Park System, the Board will consider proposals for some 16 historic landmarks, 12 natural landmarks, and a score of areas proposed for addition to the National Park System.

Profile

James H. Husted

When Congressional hearings move along smoothly on legislative proposals concerning the NPS, it is a good bet that Jim Husted is behind the scenes. For the past five years, Jim has been the Service's "strength in reserve," in the matter of systemizing the preparation, analysis and validation of support data to be presented to Congressional committees in defense of new area proposals or boundary adjustments for existing areas. Jim also coordinates the presentation of similar material for the three annual meetings of the Secretary's Advisory Board.



Jim Husted was born Nov. 17, 1912, in Schenectady, N. Y., where he later attended high school, and in 1935, graduated from New York State College of Forestry — specializing in park and recreation planning. While attending the University of California — where he received his M.S. degree in Forestry in 1940 — he courted Dorothy Rhyne who became his wife in 1941.

Jim began his Federal service career with the Dept. of Agriculture as a Jr. Recreation Engineer, and transferred to the National Park Service in 1936. He left NPS in 1937 to join the faculty of Michigan State Univ., first as instructor and later as assistant professor of Forestry — teaching all park management courses and developing the University's curricula in this field.

Returning to the Service in 1946, he was assigned to the Branch of State Cooperation in Chicago, where he remained until 1953, when he transferred to the Portland Field Office to assist in the preparation of basin-wide recreation area surveys of the Columbia and Rogue River Basins in Oregon. In August 1954, Jim transferred to Washington, D.C., and has since served continuously with the Office of Cooperative Activities, devoting most of his time to park planning activities related to new area studies and boundary revisions of existing areas. A detached retina in 1960 left Jim's vision so impaired that he can't read copy more than 2 or 3 inches away. Yet, he misses none of the minute details. To us, this is truly a "profile in courage."

Active in camping activities and civic organizations, he is now chairman of the Camp Committee, Potomac Area Council for Campfire Girls, member of the Camp Committee for the Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts, and former member of the Boy Scout Troop Committee for Troop 783 when his son, David, was active in Scouting. He is past president of Greenwood Knolls Civic Assn. in Silver Spring, Md., and is trustee of Harmony Hills Elementary School.

Jim and Dorothy have two children. Ann 20, is a senior at Syracuse U., and is interested in student government. David, 16, is a junior at Wheaton High in Md., and is active in sports. Together, the Husteds enjoy family camping, and they have barnstormed over most of the U.S., and there are few national parks they haven't seen. In spite of Jim's poor eyesight, and to the dismay of his doctor, the whole family has become interested in skiing lately, spending most of their weekends and holidays on the ski slopes in Pennsylvania.
