

Reed speaks:

Preservationists meet in Washington

"Preservation battles are lost or won at the state and local level, and fortunately you've been winning a lot of them. We at Interior are committed to full funding for your efforts, and I pledge to you that we will continue to live up to the promise of active Federal participation in historic preservation."

With these words, Assistant Secretary for Fish and Wildlife and Parks Nathaniel P. Reed opened the 1974 Annual Meeting for State Historic Preservation Officers and Federal Representatives in Washington recently. Attending the three-day meeting were approximately 150 delegates representing the historic preservation programs of 49 states, the District of Columbia and four territories; Federal agency officials appointed to implement President Nixon's Executive Order 11593; members of the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation and the National Trust for Historic Preservation; National Park Service Regional representatives, and staff of the Office of Archeology and Historic Preservation (OAHP).

The OAHP administers a broad range of historic preservation programs in cooperation with other Federal agencies and the governor-appointed State Historic Preservation Officers. These include the expansion, through state and Federal agency nominations and National Historic Landmark designations, of the National Register of Historic Places, America's official protective inventory of historic and cultural resources; historic preservation matching grants-in-aid to the states, territories and the National Trust. The OAHP also manages the Historic American Buildings Survey (HABS) and Historic

American Engineering Record (HAER), whose Library of Congress archives represent one of the world's major collections of measured drawings and other materials documenting historic struc-

tures and engineering landmarks; the National Historic Landmarks program; the archeological salvage and investigation program; implementation of Executive Order 11593,

and the transfer of surplus Federal properties for preservation.

The Executive Order, signed in May 1971, places the Federal government squarely in the business of historic preservation by requiring Federal agencies to maintain and nominate to the National Register historic properties under their control.

The Annual Meeting is an opportunity for leaders in historic preservation from across the country to review preservation accomplishments and to chart the future of Federally-supported preservation programs.

The program included a major address by Rep. John F. Seiberling of Ohio, who was introduced by Dr. Ernest Allen Connally, Associate Director, Professional Services. Rep. Seiberling is a proponent of land use legislation and an advocate of the preservation of America's historical resources.

Paraphrasing Thomas Jefferson's words that the earth belongs to the living generation, the Congressman added that "the earth is also held

in trust by the living generation for future generations" and that "it is time for Americans to think of historic preservation and its relationship to other important values that we, as a people, seek to achieve."

Rep. Julia Butler Hansen of Washington, who chairs the Interior subcommittee of the House Committee on Appropriations, and Lee McElvain, chief counsel for the House Interior and Insular Affairs Committee, joined Dr. Richard C. Curry on a panel concerning the legislative and appropriation processes as they relate to development of the Nation's historic preservation effort.

Recently-appointed Chairman of the National Trust for Historic Preservation Carlisle H. Humelsine addressed the delegates on programs and goals of the National Trust. Robert R. Garvey, Jr. and Ann Webster Smith, Executive Secretary and Director of the Office of Compliance, respectively, of the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation, presented remarks on the Council's

"Historic Resources and the Human Environment" study and the broad protection for historic properties provided in the Historic Preservation Act of 1966 and the Executive Order.

Presiding at the meeting was Dr. William J. Murtagh, Keeper of the National Register.

A social highlight of the occasion was a reception at the Smithsonian Institution Building, where an honored guest was Rep. Roy A. Taylor of North Carolina, Chairman of the House National Parks and Recreation subcommittee.

Prior to the Annual Meeting a study group of professional practicing archeologists convened to evaluate problems related to identifying preserving and protecting archeological resources, particularly in relation to survey and planning efforts undertaken by the states that are assisted by National Park Service grant-in-aid funds. Summaries of the study group's deliberations were presented.

Let's Make a Difference

Our 200th Birthday Celebration

By now we all are well aware that the year 1976 brings the 200th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence, and the year in which we will celebrate this nation's "birthday." It will be a celebration which all Americans can be proud to experience. I think some thoughts on what the Bicentennial observance means for the National Park Service are appropriate, for there is no organization, public or private, which has more of a role to play during this inspirational period when Americans will be looking at their country and heritage.

One significant facet of America's Bicentennial observance—and indeed it is a Presidential and Secretarial objective—is the NPS Bicentennial development program—reflecting our responsibility for the sites and physical artifacts of our struggle for independence. Fiscal year 1975 marks the final cycle of an ambitious three-year program to improve our historical sites directly related to the American Revolution. Completion of these projects by visitor season 1976 is among our top priorities. The Denver Service Center, Harpers Ferry Center, and our three eastern regions are actively planning and scheduling. This program includes the restoration of historic structures and battlefields; construction of visitor centers, roads and trails, parking areas, and other facilities; installation of new and creative forms of interpretation; and the construction of the National Visitor Center in Washington, D.C.

The successful and timely completion of this development program is so crucial that I recently established, under the personal leadership of the Deputy Director, a special action-oriented, problem-solving group to assure the program's execution. This Bicentennial Action Group met biweekly during the months of January and February, and has made significant progress in removing obstacles in the program.

Beyond the improvement of revolutionary war sites, however, is the role that the entire National Park System can play in the actual observance of our Bicentennial. By the nature of the sites within our care, we are thrust into the center of the quest by Americans to see where, as a nation, we have been and where we are going. We need not think in terms of the Bicentennial relating narrowly to the War for Independence. The American Revolution Bicentennial Administration has established broad themes for programs relating to the Bicentennial. Under the theme "Heritage 76" come programs which "stimulate preservation of the remaining tangible evidence of our

past and strengthen, protect, and preserve our natural heritage." "Festival USA" encourages a "nationwide effort to share with other Americans and the people of the world the traditions, the culture, and hospitality of the United States and its people." "Horizons" challenges our citizens to "consider the century ahead, to define and dedicate themselves to worthy purposes and goals, and to proceed with the attainment of these goals through various activities intended to improve the quality of life." Within these guidelines, the door is wide open for participation by all.

Each park has a golden opportunity to relate its own story to a greater theme—the celebration of America. Each site can work within its ongoing interpretive activities, as well as develop new projects so that our visitors' experiences in 1976 will have a very special meaning. My memorandum of Sept. 27, 1973, urged each area to develop a Bicentennial Action Plan. By beginning to prepare now, we will certainly have some exciting programs ready for the Bicentennial year.

As you know, the recent reorganization of the Washington Office created both an office of Assistant to the Director for Bicentennial and an Assistant Director for Interpretation. Both of these offices are assisting parks in their Bicentennial planning. The former is the office coordinating and acting as the central information point for Bicentennial activities throughout the Service, as well as serving as liaison for the NPS with American Revolution Bicentennial Administration and other national groups. Creation of the latter has the obvious effect of placing greater emphasis on interpretation, and through such innovations as the Interpreters Newsletter, will help spread ideas for Bicentennial programs. Harpers Ferry Center is now planning Bicentennial interpretive materials which will be available to all parks.

I am well aware of the many other priorities of park management. But the opportunity presented by the Nation's 200th birthday will not come again. I am counting on you all, first as dedicated employees of the National Park Service, and more importantly as Americans, to put forth the extra effort it will take to meet this challenge.

Park Police canine teams graduate

Five U.S. Park Police officers and their German Shepherd dogs

formally became part of the Park Police's dog-patrol unit when they

graduated in ceremonies recently at the Rock Creek Park Police Stables.

The graduation exercise climaxed 20 weeks of intensive training for the Park Police officers and their dogs, donated by four Washington area residents.

As part of the graduation exercises the dog units performed in two divisions of their training: advanced obedience and confidence agility.

Park Police officer Gordon B. Hackett Jr., a K-9 officer with the department for the past five years heads the dog-training program. He said advanced obedience drills demonstrate how well the dogs have learned to respond to verbal commands from the officers. Confidence-agility drills show the "tremendous confidence and skills the dogs have developed in themselves," with dogs jumping through rings of fire, climbing steep objects and jumping unusual heights.

The U.S. Park Police was the first metropolitan-area police force to use dogs, establishing the first dog unit in 1957.

Following graduation, the five dog-teams will be used to patrol in police vehicles and on foot in the National Capital Parks, which covers some 46,000 acres of parkland in metropolitan Washington.

Initial training consists of basic and advanced obedience; agility and attack work; scent work, such as tracking and crime scene searching;

building search; and open searching. Helicopter training is also included.

The dog team, explained Officer Hackett, is given extensive track and search training and when emergencies arise, dog teams can be transported to crime scene areas by helicopter.

The dogs are taken home daily and live with their masters and families.

Sierra skiing safer now



Skiing up to Tuolumne Meadows? You'll find company there... Linda Halvorsen, Bill Nickell, Jeff Mathis, and Gary Richards.

TUOLUMNE MEADOWS, YOSEMITE NP, Calif., — Park Ranger Jeff Mathis stood at the work bench in his living room fabricating a sheet metal replacement for the toe plate on a cross-country ski boot.

A bothersome task, but in this case a mighty necessary one. The owner of the boot was stranded near Mathis' winter ranger station here in Yosemite National Park's High Sierra, with no way to make repairs. The skier was 21 miles from his destination, Yosemite Valley, and 20 miles from his starting point at Lee Vining, Calif., along Highway 395.

Mathis is a resourceful type and soon had the fellow on his way. The tremendous increase in Yosemite high country winter use and some catchy enthusiasm on the part of Mathis and three long-time friends have resulted in a brand new program for the Sierra: an all-winter ranger station staffed to help visitors and monitor use here at Tuolumne Meadows along the Tioga Road. Tuolumne, a summertime

hikers' Mecca, has come into its own as a year-round recreation spot.

Mathis, of Merced, Calif., spent last winter as the park ranger at Ostrander Lake Ski Hut, also in Yosemite. Just after Labor Day last fall, he and Gary Richards of San Anselmo, Bill Nickell of Oakland, and Linda Halvorsen of Whittier, approached the National Park Service with the proposal that Mathis be a paid park ranger, and the other three volunteers, and that they all spend the winter in the Meadows. Noting the skills of the young people and the projected visitor increases, the Park Service agreed.

In mid-September the quartet began chopping wood and making shopping lists. The goal: to be completely self-sufficient and ready for six months of high-country winter by the time the Tioga Road closed for the season in November. By mid-February they had put in more than 3,000 hours of volunteer work and patrol.

The exercise is paying off, in the view of both the young people and the Park Service. Since the snows

came, they have made routine patrols around all buildings in the area watching for damage from both snow and vandals. They have met 310 winter visitors spending 830 man-days in or near the Meadows.

Mathis and his friends talk to people, exchange information on snow and avalanche conditions, on other travelers, and on touring experiences. The ranger station is in regular radio communication with Yosemite Valley and is on watch for every party that signs out for Tuolumne.

If skiers are overdue, the Tuolumne people go into action. They've participated in several rescues, and are credited with saving the life of a young man from Minnesota lost near Tenaya Peak. They take daily readings on their weather hygrothermograph and keep careful notes on precipitation and temperature.

But what about their off-duty times? What's it like up there?

"The task is tremendous," wrote Jeff in his journal on Oct. 7, during the frenzy of preparation. The good planning and hours of effort have

paid off, though, with a comfortable and happy home.

More than 40 cords of wood were stacked in the basement before the snows came. A 200-volume library was assembled. There's electricity most of the time, so his stereo and 75 records were brought in.

Food was the major item to plan for and now, with two gourmet cooks in the group, its preparation and consumption is a major pastime. Not long ago Linda produced quiche Lorraine on the big wood stove with ingredients from a well-stocked root cellar under the house.

The foursome brought in 45 dozen eggs, all packed in sawdust in 17 half-gallon Civil Defense drums. The 40 pounds of cheese hasn't yet been bothered by varmits, but the turnips were casualties in the damp cold cellar. After a lot of research, \$1,400 went into foodstuffs, including 100 pounds of canned ham, 15 gallons of honey, 100 pounds of onions, 75 pounds of carrots, 150 pounds of various beans and grains, 30 pounds of 17 varieties of fresh exotic coffees, and cases and cases of canned fruits and vegetables.

As one might imagine, any friend who skis in gets a welcome, but one who appears with a two-day old, partially frozen head of lettuce is a hero! All food preparation is done on a wood stove.

The group is headquartered at the building which houses the Mountaineering Center in the summer. A sign points this out as a ranger station and travelers are welcome. The four emphasize, however, that this is their home, not a lodge or crash pad for cold and hungry travelers. The Park Service has placed six bunks and firewood in the Tuolumne Meadows Visitor Center and skiers are welcome to use that accommodation.

Many have. About 30 men and women, Americans and foreign visitors, welcomed the New Year there. Some, however, have set out for the Meadows and found the trip more strenuous than they expected. Mathis estimates that about half the people who start out are "local mountain people," meaning climbers, skiers, and concession and Park Service employees who spend most of their year in the Park.

Most are in good shape and 75 percent of them complete their planned trip. Of the rest, less than half of those who set out make it to the Meadows. "They just don't realize

how hard it is to get to Tuolumne in the winter," says Mathis. "They don't have the stamina." It is a 21-mile trip one way and can be done in two days if the skier is in good shape.

Mathis emphasizes that all ski parties should carry maps, a compass, bivouac gear, wool clothing, avalanche gear, a tent, and a stove. He warns of extreme avalanche danger near Omsted Point, Polly Dome, Spring Hill and Lee Vining Canyon.

It has been a winter full of many activities, skiing under the beauti-

ful Sierra blue skies, huddling inside when it's cold and treating skiers with frost-bitten fingers. The four keep a detailed log of experiences, weather and visitors, even checking out reports of flying saucers (which turned out to be an electric light glowing from stables on a hill).

And how is the venturesome foursome reacting, always so isolated and surrounded by snow, rock, ice and quiet?

"We hope winter lasts until August" grins Jeff.
