Recent News

- The 2022 camping season at Cape Point and Frisco campgrounds will begin Friday, April 2 and end Monday, Nov. 28. The Oregon Inlet and Ocracoke campgrounds are open year round. Reservations and payments for camp sites at the four campgrounds must be made online at www.recreation.gov.
- Debris from a collapsed house continues to be found on Cape Hatteras National Seashore (Seashore) beaches. If the owner of the house is unable to complete the extensive debris cleanup, the Seashore may hire its own contractor to continue the cleanup effort. The area near the fallen house remains closed to the public and the Seashore has been in contact with owners of other homes along Ocean Drive in Rodanthe.
