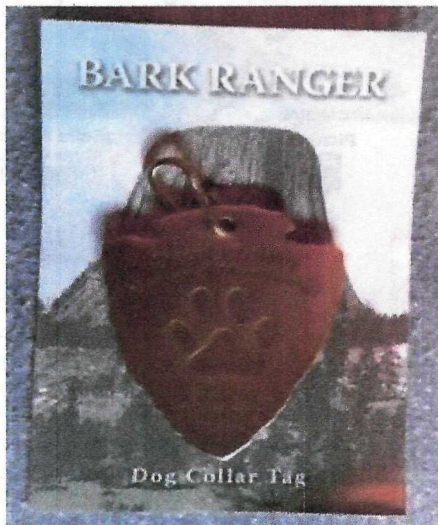

BARK-RANGER PROGRAM



BARK Ranger is a program to teach dog owners about the benefits of visiting the park with a dog as well as the rules of **BARK**:

- ◆ **Bag** your pets waste and dispose of it in a trash container
- ◆ **Always** wear a leash not more than six (6) feet long
- ◆ **Respect Wildlife.** Don't harass, chase, harm or bark at wildlife
- ◆ **Know** where you can go:
Campgrounds, paved or graveled roads and parking lots, grassy areas and shoulders within and immediately adjacent to parking lots, and thr Picnic Area.

Dogs completing the short program will be sworn in as "Bark Rangers" and will receive a Bark Ranger Certificate. The Bark Ranger Collar Tag may be purchased at the DTNHA store located in the Visitor Center. This program is free and all dogs are welcome to become Bark Rangers. As a Bark Ranger you and your canine will become Ambassadors within the National Park Service by following the rules, serving as a good role model to other visitors, human and canine.



ADA Compliant Service Animals are allowed in all facilities and on all trails unless an area has been closed by the Superintendent to protect park resources.

The 2010 revision to Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), defines a "service animal" as a dog that has been individually trained to do work, or perform tasks for the benefit of an individual with a disability, including a physical, sensory, psychiatric, intellectual, or other mental disability.

Dogs that are not trained to perform tasks that mitigate the effects of a disability, including dogs that are used purely to provide comfort or emotional support ("therapy animals"), are considered pets. Falsely portraying a pet as a service animal is considered fraud and is subject to federal prosecution.
