




Mammals of Lava Beds

Lava Beds National Monument has over 50 species of mammals, fourteen of which are bats. The most frequently seen are coyotes, ground squirrels, jack rabbits, cottontail rabbits, and groups of mule deer. Kangaroo rats are commonly seen on summer evenings as they run across the roads. Please obey the speed limits in the monument in order to avoid hitting the wildlife. Please do not share your lunch with any wild animal!
