Winding its way through American History

Stretching from the Mississippi River in Natchez through the Shoals area in Alabama and across the Tennessee Valley to Nashville, the Old Trace was first used by American Indians. In the early 1800s, it was the main return route for Ohio Valley traders who, rather than fight the Mississippi currents, sold their flatboats for the value of their timber in Natchez and walked home through Choctaw and Chickasaw territory via the Old Trace.

By mid-century, steamboats made the trek unnecessary, and the Old Trace disappeared into the trees. Today, the 44-mile National Scenic Byway and All-American Road has emerged as one of America's most important examples of our nation's natural and cultural heritage. Administered by the National Park Service, the road's non-commercial environment coupled with a wide variety of historic sites, wayside exhibits and beautiful venues make it a memorable destination for an unhurried trip that both reveals and explains a unique time in our country's history.

MS PORT GIBSON

About 40 miles outside of Natchez is the historic town of PORT GIBSON that features homes, churches and public buildings in a town General U.S. Grant declared "too beautiful to burn." The Ruins of Windsor showcase the stark beauty of the once stately Greek Revival mansion and offers visitors a glimpse back in time.

MS RAYMOND

Another 40 miles north brings you to the small antebellum city of RAYMOND. Raymond welcomes visitors with its picturesque charm and Civil War history. A driving tour highlights the historic Hinds County Courthouse (1859) and the architectural heritage of a National Register Historic District. The Confederate Cemetery and the Civil War Battlefield with its walking trail offer opportunities to explore history.

MS RIDGELAND

MS KOSCIUSKO

Leaving Ridgeland, the Ross Barnett Reservoir parallels the Parkway for several miles and offers some of Mississippi's most beautiful scenery. An hour north of the reservoir is KOSCIUSKO, one of the oldest remaining settlements on the Parkway and once a campsite for travelers making the long trip from Natchez to Nashville. Today, visitors can enjoy a variety of antique shops, restaurants and a bed and breakfast inn. Kosciusko celebrates the birthplace of Oprah Winfrey and the annual Natchez Trace Festival.

MS FRENCH CAMP

FRENCH CAMP, 22 miles north of Kosciusko, was established circa 1810 by Louis LeFleur as LeFleur's Stand. This stop includes a Visitors Center, Council House Café, historic village, bed & breakfast inn, museum, crafts and sorghum making. Less than 15 minutes from French Camp is Jeff Busby, featuring picnic and camping areas, self-guiding trails and an overlook that is one of Mississippi's highest points (603 feet).

MS TUPELO

Continuing the journey northward brings you to TUPELO and the headquarters for the Parkway. Located at the Parkway Visitor Center are self-guiding trails, restrooms, exhibits and an orientation film. Visitors can also enjoy Tupelo's museums, numerous restaurants and hotels, historical sites and attractions, including the Elvis Presley Birthplace, Tupelo Automobile Museum and the Tupelo Buffalo Park.

TISHOMINGO COUNTY—Located in the foothills of the Appalachian Mountain's beautiful vistas and home to Woodall Mountain, the highest point in Mississippi, two award-winning state parks, a national park, 50,000 acres of lakes, more than 12,000 acres of protected hunting areas and 10 Corps of Engineers parks. An outdoor enthusiast's paradise - caves, canyons, swing bridge, covered bridge and miles of hiking trails and streams perfect for canoeing, fishing and swimming. 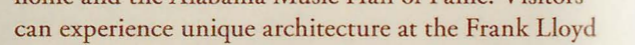
Heading out of Tishomingo County, ALABAMA is practically next door. COLBERT FERRY, located on the Trace about 18 miles after you enter the state, offers beautiful picnic, fishing and boating areas.

The SHOALS AREA—Tuscumbia, Sheffield, Muscle Shoals and Florence—is located some 15 minutes east of the Trace where notable attractions in Tuscumbia include the Helen Keller Birthplace and childhood home and the Alabama Music Hall of Fame. Visitors can experience unique architecture at the Frank Lloyd Wright-designed Rosenbaum home and then jazz their blues away at the W.C. Handy, "Father of the Blues," Birthplace and Museum in Florence. Visit the area's recording studios to discover Muscle Shoals music in "Sweet Home Alabama."

Heading north, find the grave of Meriwether Lewis of the Lewis and Clark fame. Here are self-guiding trails, campgrounds, restrooms and a picnic area alongside a creek for some playful fun. As you continue north through a scenic landscape of forests, streams and waterfalls, tour the attractions of Hohenwald, ranging from an Amish-Mennonite settlement to a 60's era commune, plus a natural history museum, wineries, the Elephant Sanctuary in the Tennessee Welcome Center, an art gallery, golfing and much more.
