



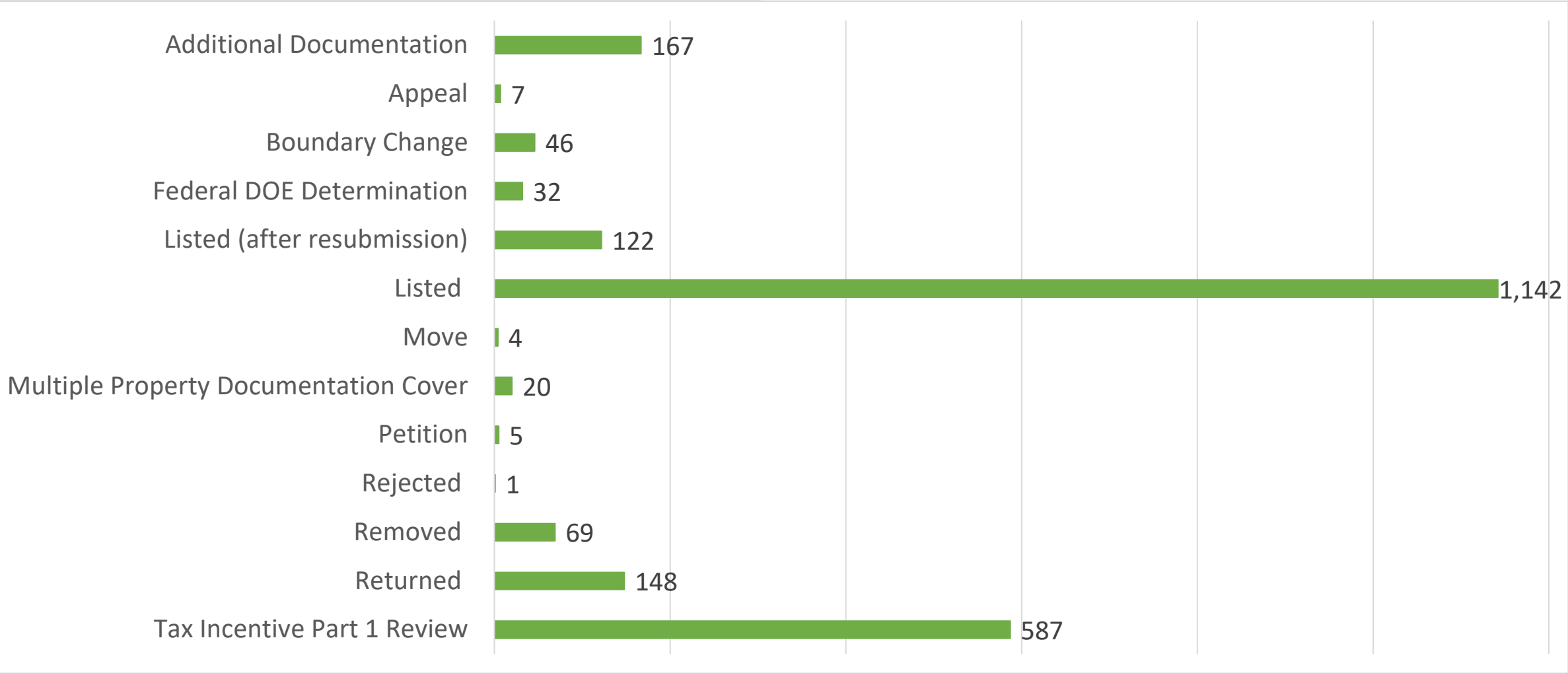

Fuller Brush Co. Factory, Connecticut (100011608). This nationally significant 1922 factory building is unusual for its intentional resemblance to a school building in the popular Collegiate Gothic style. The project to renovate the building into residences leverages Federal historic tax credits.

Care Bulletin Revision and Reissuance Project Update

Last fall, the National Register of Historic Places formally launched the project to update its core guidance for preparing National Register actions in Washington, D.C. Two issues are still in progress for publication (Ontario Historic Conference of State Historic Preservationists).

On May 9, 2025, the National Register of Historic Places announced, over 100,000 properties have been listed for their historic value, an achievement, engineering, and skill. Formally established in 1966 under the National Historic Preservation Act, the official list of historic places in the United States. These buildings, structures, objects, and sites, including representations of the nation's history, reflect and affirm the values that have shaped our country. • Farewell to Rustin Quiside, Lisa Delfino, and Ross Bater

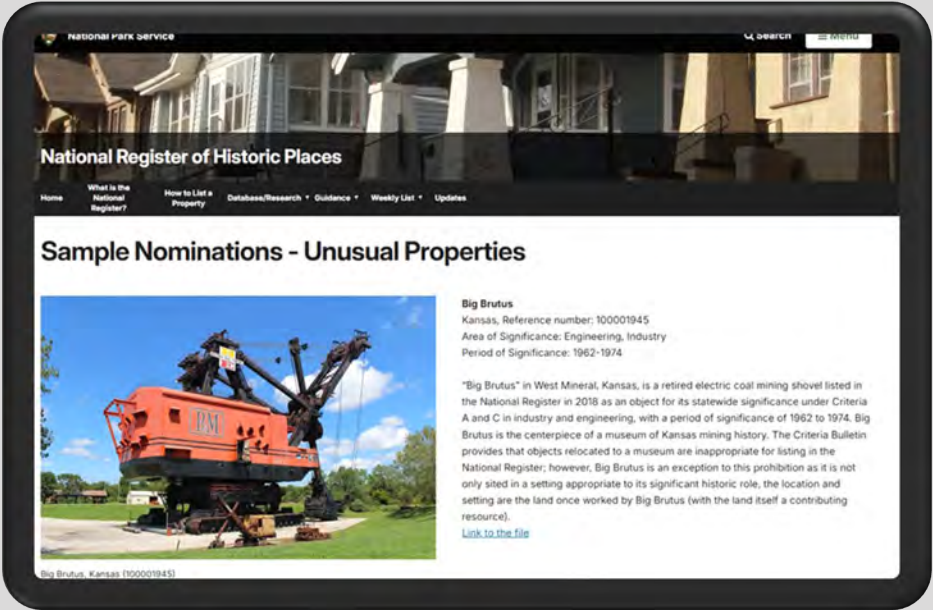

Rustin graduated from Virginia Commonwealth University with a master's degree in history and George Mason University with a degree in English, where he studied under Russian linguist and author Vasily Alexandrov. He is currently giving retirement to an empty nest—he has daughter recently graduated from Rustin's alma mater, Virginia Commonwealth University—in his Maryland.

Dine-A-Ville Dinosaur, Utah (100009526). This 40-foot-tall anthropomorphic pink dinosaur was erected in 1958 of wire mesh and fiberglass resin on a metal frame. It was moved in 1999 to a location which has the orientation, setting, and general environment comparable to its historic location and compatible with its significance for art and entertainment/recreation.

Savannah Powder Magazine, Georgia (100011426). The Savannah Powder Magazine is a significant local example of magazine construction. Built by the City of Savannah and operated under the watchful eye of the city-appointed Keeper of the Powder Magazine, it was the only non-military facility of its kind in the area, providing a secure location for the storage of explosive materials during its period of operation of 1898 to 1971.

Quindaro Townsite, Kansas. This property is a rare example of a multiracial and multicultural free-state port established through cooperation among the Wyandot Tribe, European Americans, and African Americans. The nomination was approved by the NHL Committee in May 2025 and is pending review by the National Park System Advisory Board and designation by the Secretary of the Interior.

Indian Boarding Schools NHL Project

- Development of national context for Federal Indian boarding schools in the United States
- Preparation of a new NHL nomination for Stewart Indian Boarding School
- Partnership with National Association of Tribal Historic Preservation Officers (NATHPO)

Stewart Indian Boarding School, Nevada. Opened in 1890, the school retains a largely intact campus of buildings used to further the Federal policy of assimilation of Native American children. Students came from dozens of tribes around the United States and participated in vocational programs including masonry construction of many of the school buildings.

National Historic Landmarks: Work in Progress

Black High Schools, 1870-1970

- Project to identify nationally significant properties associated with segregated Black secondary education
- Partnership with Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH)
- Report from scholars’ roundtable and community forum at 2025 ASALH Conference underway for 2026 completion



Marlboro County Training School, South Carolina. This historic school opened in 1928, serving grades 1 through 11 until 1948 and adding grade 12 the next year. It was listed in the National Register of Historic Places in April 2025.

National Historic Landmarks: Work in Progress



Tuskegee VA Medical Center, Tuskegee, AL

- NHL nomination of segregated veterans' hospital led by Black administrators and medical staff
- Partnership with VA Historic Preservation Office

Tuskegee Veterans Affairs Medical Center, Alabama. Tuskegee VA hospital was established in 1922 as the first and only hospital built by the Federal government exclusively for Black veterans. Following a national campaign led by the NAACP, it also became one of the largest hospitals staffed by Black administrators and medical professionals.

Bodie Historic District NHL, California. Located in the high desert east of the Sierra Nevada, the mining ghost town of Bodie was designated an NHL in 1961. Updated documentation approved by the NHL Committee in May 2025 expands discussion of Western mining history and provides an accurate boundary and inventory of historic resources.

National Register of Historic Places and National Historic Landmarks Program | 2025 Year in Review



Tukihasan Oyanke, Minnesota (100012156 restricted). This place, also known as the Winter Shell site (21CR189), is a small Late Woodland archeological site located on the Minnesota River. The site was discovered after a flood event exposed a portion of it, resulting in portions of the shell midden eroding into the river. The nomination provides an excellent example of documentation quickly, but thoroughly, completed shortly after discovery of a site and determination of its significance.
