

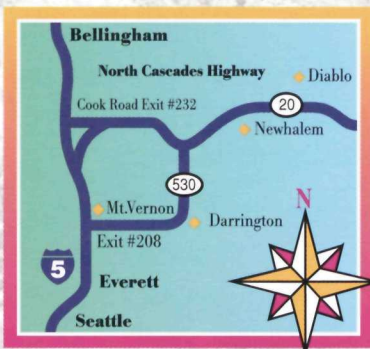

How to Get There

From Interstate 5, take the Cook Road exit (#232) located about 4 miles north of Mt. Vernon.

Follow State Route 20, the North Cascades Highway, 70 miles through the scenic Skagit Valley to Diablo. Signs in Diablo will direct you to the Tour Center.



An alternate route follows Highway 530 through the community of Darrington.

Reservations and Information

Tours run mid-June through September. Thursday through Monday. Weekend only tours through September. Closed July 4 and Labor Day.

Spend a day at our Skagit Hydroelectric Project, surrounded by the rugged beauty of the North Cascades.

See the monumental dams and generating facilities producing electricity for Seattle - 140 miles away. Walk through an operating hydroelectric turbine. Relax while cruising the glacier-fed emerald-green waters of Diablo Lake. Enjoy an all-you-can-eat family-style meal or a cold picnic lunch after the tour.



Stroll through woodland trails, nature walks and beautiful gardens. Step into the past with a ride 560 feet up the side of

Sourdough Mountain on the antique Incline Railway - one of the last of its kind in the world.

Hear an entertaining history of the Skagit Project in our comfortable theater. See the majesty of the North Cascades unfold on a spectacular 560-foot ride up Sourdough Mountain on the Incline Railway. Smell the crisp alpine air during a 25-minute cruise on scenic Diablo Lake to Ross Powerhouse.



Feel the power of the mammoth Ross generators as you walk through an operating hydroelectric plant. Savor our all-you-can-eat chicken or vegetarian spaghetti dinner with home baked rolls and apple pie à la mode.

The Diablo tour, a 90-minute guided tour covering the highlights of the Skagit Project, is perfect for those traveling the scenic Cascade Loop or on a limited time schedule.



Enjoy a colorful Skagit history video, experience the thrill of a 560-foot ride up the Incline



Railway, take an up-close look at Diablo Lake and Canyon, and walk across ornate Diablo Dam.

Bring a picnic lunch or purchase the makings at the Skagit General Store in Newhalem and enjoy our

beautiful grounds.

Discover the Skagit

Stay a little longer and enjoy our well-equipped picnic sites and beautifully landscaped grounds.

Visit the Gorge Powerhouse visitors' gallery with its interpretive exhibits, and the Diablo Museum.



Bask in the breathtaking beauty of the North Cascades while riding the Historic Incline Railway.

In Newhalem climb into the cab of "Old Number Six," a restored Baldwin steam engine, and ring its big

brass bell. Kids love it!

Visit the historic Skagit General Store.

Enjoy Ladder Creek Falls (lit and lovely at night), our beautiful Rock Gardens and Trail of the Cedars.



Explore nearby recreation activities - everything from hiking to white-water rafting to eagle-watching.

See local wildlife and stunning views from the Diablo Lake overlook.



Stroll the Happy Creek boardwalk, an elevated path through an ancient forest grove. Wheelchair accessible.
