Many thanks for your letter of October 15.

I do not have any Wyandotte cave black & white photographs here in Pasadena; they are in storage with some other material some distance away. However, I expect to get this material out of storage this coming Monday (November 1) and will select some prints for you.

I have duplicate slides of most of my Wyandotte Kodachromes. However, as you know, duplicates are not as good as the originals, but I'll send them along and we'll see what you think of them.

As for price: this is a moot question. I certainly would not want to "over charge" the department. What is your usual allowance for his type of material? I feel this is on more of a sort of "friendship" basis, and would not want to handle it the way I would with a magazine: which would be to demand all the traffic would bear!

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I do not recall whether I mentioned in my original letter, but there are a lot of more-or-less "unknown" caves on the Wyandotte property, and all speleologists familiar with the area believe that many more await discovery.

As usual, letters like yours have a way of being carried over while trying to handle the flood of paperwork, field trip assignments and other pressure jobs. I do appreciate your generous response to the matter of photos and other information on Wyandotte and Marengo Caves.

Upon inquiry, I think we can arrange for fair reimbursement for the 15 or so Wyandotte photos. Perhaps a couple of photos of the most important features of Marengo might be included.

Perhaps it is best not to go beyond this limited scale for the present. If consideration for establishment as a unit of the National Park System, or inclusion in a broader study, should become real active a few months hence as might be the case, I could then get in touch with you for additional materials. It is just possible we may want to arrange for someone from our Regional Office in San Francisco to visit you for additional pictures and background historical information if this matter should become more active in the future. As to prices, I think the traffic could bear the cost of your getting the photos made on the approximate established rates for such work.

It was good to hear from you. Your change in address is noted. I am pleased with the information on how well Harry Parker's son is doing. While I knew Harry quite well, his son grew up without my having a chance to see much of him, and spent last summer as a geologist with a party in southern Oregon. He is a fine young man and I'm proud of him. Again, thanks for your cooperation and assistance. I am unable now to know how active the Wyandotte matter might become but in the past Mr. Denton wanted the subject investigated further which gave impetus to my trip over there last summer.
