River Raisin Heritage Trail www.rrtrail.com or www.michigantrails.org	The River Raisin Heritage Trail is a 4.5 mile trail that links the River Raisin National Battlefield Park, Sterling State Park and Historic Downtown Monroe, Michigan. You can begin your journey on the trail from multiple locations.
Sterling State Park www.dnr.state.mi.us/parksandtrails/	Michigan's only State Park on Lake Erie, Sterling State Park boasts over 1,300 acres of great recreational opportunities including over one mile of lakefront and six miles of trails. Visitors can enjoy the beach, boating, fishing, wildlife viewing, hiking, picnicing or camping. An easy walk from River Raisin National Battlefield Park.
General George Armstrong Custer Childhood Home and Statue http://www.co.monroe.mi.us/government/depart	Monroe is the home to General George Armstrong Custer and is rich with historic sites and information about General Custer. Visitors are often intrigued by General Custer's connection to the survivors of the War of 1812 battles of the River Raisin. While in Monroe ask for a copy of the General Custer map and

The Navaree-Anderson Trading Post Complex http://www.co.monroe.mi.us/government/depart ments_offices/museum/index.html	The Navarre-Anderson Trading Post Complex dates to the late 1700's and early 1800 and include the Trading Post, Navarre-Morris Cabin and Barn. Visitors can step back in time as they explore this wonderful site.
Historic Downtown Monroe	Downtown Monroe has much to offer visitors from a river walk, shopping, fun festivals and great food to museums, historic sites and art.

Monroe's Historic Woodland Cemetery	Established in 1810, Woodland is one of Michigan's oldest public cemeteries. Here rests pioneers, political/public officials and veterans of every U.S. Military conflict from the Revolutionary War to Vietnam.

Dundee's Old Mill Museum	Experience the joys of yesteryear at the Old Mill Museum as you learn about the Ford Village Industries, life in the early 18 th century and Native American life or the Macon Reserve.
Fort Meigs	A focal point in the War 1812 this National Historic Landmark contains North America's largest restored stockade fortification on a 10 acre compound.
