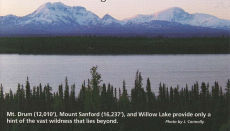




# Wrangell-St. Elias

*Visit America's Largest National Park*

Incredible! You must see Wrangell-St. Elias to believe it. Number and scale loom large here, magnified by splendid isolation. At over 13 million acres, this is our largest National Park. Rugged and wild, it is a land of lofty summits, roaring rivers, immense glaciers, and rich human history. Hike its mountains, float its rivers, ski its glaciers, or fly over this landscape, and you witness living geology.

You sense discovery, the feeling that you might be the very first to see such sights.

Begin this discovery at the Wrangell-St. Elias Visitor Center, located along the Richardson Highway, ten miles south of Glennallen, Alaska.



## What's So Special About This Place?

-  Vast, rugged, icy, and wild, Wrangell-St. Elias provides for endless discovery, reflection, recreation, and adventure.
-  Diverse wildlife, including Dall sheep, grizzly bears, caribou, moose, salmon, and trumpeter swans thrive in this, our nation's largest National Park.
-  Steaming Mt. Wrangell, an active volcano, and nine of the 16 highest peaks in the U.S. form the backdrop for the vigorous story of plate tectonics and volcanism still unfolding here.
-  More than just a National Park, Wrangell-St. Elias, along with Glacier Bay, Klauame National Park, and Tatshenshini-Alsek Provincial Park make up a 24 million acre World Heritage Site, one of the largest protected areas on earth.



Begin your discovery of Wrangell-St. Elias at the Park Visitor Center, located 10 miles south of Glennallen, AK, along the Richardson Hwy.

### How To Get Here

The Wrangell-St. Elias National Park Visitor Center is located at mile 106.8 along the Richardson Highway (10 miles south of Glennallen, AK). The center is open every day during the summer, and weekdays during the winter months.

### What To Do

The Visitor Center is the best place to begin your discovery of this immense park. Park Rangers are available to help you plan a visit and appreciate the wonders of this spectacular place. While there, pick up a visitor's guide and get the latest road and weather conditions.
