See All of Yellowstone Park

Much of the beauty and appeal of Yellowstone lies away from the main loop roads. So that you may know and enjoy the allure of these hidden places, motor trips, saddle horse trails, nature walks, fishing and picnic excursions are outlined here. They bring you the charm and adventure of forests, streams, mountains, lakes, and countless wonders of the Park so often missed by the hurried visitor.



Saddle Horse Trips

Ride far from the beaten path over scenic mountain trails into the wild, game country, after the manner of the pioneers. All trips are escorted by a cowboy guide. The regular daily trips are as follows:



Point Sublime—A ride along the rim of the Canyon past Artist Point to Point Sublime. The

return trip is made through virgin pine forests past Lily Pad and Clear lakes. A 7-mile trip, time about 2 hours, price \$2. Lv. 9 a.m.

Lost Lake—Scenic trip over rolling foothills through big game country to Lost Lake. A splendid opportunity to observe moose, elk, and other animals in their natural haunts. A 12-mile trip, time about 3 hours, each person \$2.50. Leaves Lodge at 2 p.m.

Ribbon Falls—A ride along the Canyon Rim trail to Ribbon Falls which affords excellent views of the lower reaches of the Canyon as well as a panoramic view from Artist Point. Return over old game trails amidst verdant lodge pole pines and grassy parks. A 12-mile trip, time about 3 hours, each person \$2.50. Leave Lodge at 2 p.m.

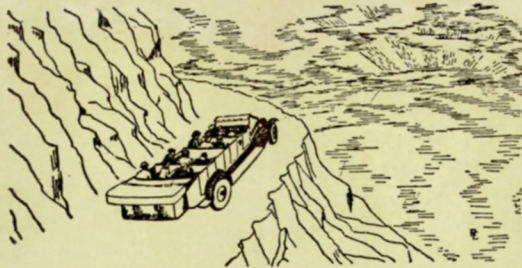
Special Trips—Ride horseback to remote fishing streams. All day or short afternoon fishing trips may be made by arrangement with the cowboy or Transportation Agent.

Walking Trip

Along Uncle Tom's Trail—Leaves Lodge 8:30 a.m., returns at 11. Conducted by a National Park Service Ranger Naturalist. No charge.

Savage Show

In Lobby every evening from 8 to 9. An unusual, sprightly, and delightfully informal program of folk-lore songs, acts, and skits—all characteristic of the Yellowstone—staged by savage (employee) talent. You are cordially invited to join in this hour of entertainment. Dancing from 9 to 10.



Mt. Washburn A Spectacular Motor Trip to Its Pinnacle

Up, up, and up! At every twist and turn of the one way road, a changing vista. Up to an altitude of 10,317 feet, a dramatic but comfortable and safe ascent to the highest peak in the Park accessible by motor.

From this vantage in the skies you are on a par with the eagles—the whole of Yellowstone in all its beauty spreads before you like a map, and the 20-power Zeiss telescope lends detail to the eye.

You can look beyond the boundaries of three states, and you can often see Rocky Mountain sheep scrambling over rocky crags.

A cozy ranger station atop the pinnacle, a guest register for you to sign, a mountaineer naturalist on hand to point out and explain all the features.

Mt. Washburn is awe inspiring—thrilling! You must see it.

Sunrise Trip to Peak of Mt. Washburn—See the sun rise majestically over the eastern mountains. From Alpine heights watch the Park panorama change from gray dawn to brilliant daylight. Round trip \$3.00 per person. Arrange with Transportation Agent before 7:30 p.m.

Morning Trip—Leaves at 9:15. Minimum of five fares, each person \$2.00.

Afternoon Trip—Leaves at 2:15. Minimum of five fares, each person \$2.00.

Mt. Washburn and Return—Busses leave Lodge at 2:00 p.m. Fare \$2.00 each person. Minimum of four fares required.

Motor Trips

Canyon Rim Ride—See the Canyon from all points of vantage. Stops made at all points along both rims, including Artist Point; the Upper and Lower Falls, Grand View, Point Lookout, Inspiration Point, and Canyon Hotel. An excellent opportunity to take snapshots of the Canyon from many angles for the memory album, so bring your camera with you. Cars leave the Lodge at 9:10 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Fare \$1.00 per person. Minimum of four fares are required.



For other motor trips, see "Mt. Washburn" and "Bear Show" headings.

Bear Show

Regular daily circus feature at Otter Creek every evening is the big free show staged by the bears themselves during their al fresco supper hour. Plenty of seats for spectators, plenty of



bears, and plenty of laughs. Here one sees comedy, as where two cocky bears dispute a choice morsel; pathos, when a mother battles for her cubs; swift-moving drama, when the gangster grizzlies invade the scene to rout the blacks and browns.

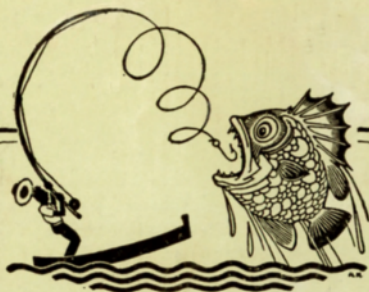
Busses leave Lodge for the Bear Show at 7 p.m. Fare, each person, \$1.00, which includes a game-stalking trip in an attempt to see elk and moose.

¶ A 15-mile ride to Yellowstone Lake by bus or in your own car . . then a thrilling Speed Boat cruise to Stevenson Island, where rowboats and tackle are provided . . here you start landing them, and later, you feast on your catch . . explore in leisure this enchanting isle while an experienced camp guide prepares your trout into an appetizing meal. Return to mainland after lunch, thence to Canyon.

¶ Fun abounds in the excitement of the sport, and in the swift Speed Boat dash.
